-The Isabella, Catawba, and Scup-pernong grape, the best varieties in the country, are natives of North Carolina. -The Rev. Lucius Cuthbert has been compelled by ill-health to resign his

position as pastor of the Baptist Cau ch at Aiken. -E. J. Cain, sheriff of Orangeburg, is said to be a defaulter, and the treasurer of the county is non-e-t.

- The Cunard steamship company have determined to withdraw their vessels from the West India s rv.ce at an early day, and establin a daily line letween Liverpool and New York.

- The great advantages of Port Royal as a sea port are attracting more general attention than ever before, within and beyond the state.

-The warrants for the arrest of ninety counterfeiters, and those imp icated in East Tennessee and North Carolina, have been issued. The implicated parties include lawyers, doctors, justices of peace, po tmasters, United States deputy marshals, clerks of courts and numerous merchants.

-As an evidence of the immense capacity and splendid condition of the mills of the Pensacol Lumber Company, at Molino, it is stated that some days since they sawed in six days (eleven hours a day), seven hundred thousand feet of lumber, all board measure.

-The article on duelling proposed in the Pennsylvania Constitutional Convention was finally passed in this form: "Any person who shall fight a duel or any person who shall light a duel of send a challenge for that purpose, or be aider of a better in fighting a duel, shall be deprived of the right of holding any office of honor or profit in this State, and may be otherwise punished as shall be prescibed by law.'

-The Mobile Register says: "If, as predicted by competent judges, the cot-ton crop of the South should reach four million bales and sell at even only 15 cts, -putting the bale down at 450 pounds, or \$62 50 a bale—the proceeds would not be less than two hundred and ninety million dollars, or far more than the united capital of all the national banks.

-There is a difference of opinion, regarding the holding of an election to fill the vacancy caused by trial justice Levy of Charleston, accepting his salary as trial justice. Levy holds that the extra session is a part of the old legislature, for the term of which he has received pay. and that the state cannot be put to the expense of paying another member to fill his place; also, that he is not disqualified, not having been confirmed by the senate.
