Rates of Postage.

Single letters, not exceeding a half ounce n weight, to any part of the Confederate States, shall be each 10 cents:

An additional single rate for each additional half ounce or less. Drop letters 2 cents each.

In the foregoing cases, the postage to be prepaid by stamps or stamped envelopes. Advertised letters 2 cents each.

. On Newspapers.

Sent to regular and bona fide subscribers from the office of publication, and not exceed ing three ounces in weight :

Weekly paper, 13 cents per quarter, Semi-Weekly paper, 26 cents per quarter. Tri-Weekly paper, 29 cents per quarter. Four times a week, 56 cents per quarter. Five times a week, 65 cents per quarter. Six times a week, 78 cents per quarter.

On Periodicals. Periodicals published oftener than Semimonthly shall be charged as newspapers. Periodicals published monthly, not exceed-ing 1 and one half ounces weight, 1 cent on each number, and one cent additional or each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

On Transient Printed Matter.

That the said Boards be required to forward Railroad Receipts for the Tax in Kind, immediately upon shipment thereof, to the Commissary General, who will pay all expenses and keep an acount thereof, charging each Board in whose favor any excess of Tax in Kind shall be ascertained to be due, which amount shall be deducted from the portion due such Boards for the value of *commuted, an apportionment of which will be unde when the Returns are completed.

Soldiers in the Amar P. A. TIVES OF Richmond, February 20, 1864. Soldiers in the Array of Northern Vir-gins, are hereby notified that an arrange-ment has this day been effected with the Southern Express Company to carry all packages of food and wearing apparel to Richmond, Va. To scenre the advantages thus obtained through the Express Company, the following instructions must be observed :

Packages must not contain more than one hundred pounds, be well sectored and plainly nurked, and sent at the expense of the shipper to either of the Soldiers' 1 olief Association, which are located as follows-

In North Carolina, at Raleigh ; in South Carolina, at Columbia: in Georgia, at Augusta; in Alabama, at Montgomery : or to any other point at which one of these Associations have an office.

The Agents of these Associations will there take charge of them and ship daily by Southern express Company to the proper Agents of the respective States at Richmond, who will see them distributed to the proper individual owners.

To meet the wishes of the soldiers and to give them a certain and speedy communication with home, the Southern Express Company has agreed to give this freight prefer-ence over everything else, and, in order that no obstacle may occur to the success of so Inducties an enterprise, the several Railroad Companies are hereby requested to render the express company such facilities, as will enable it to make this arrangement a complete success.

As the Southern Express Company assumes all responsibility of the transportation of these packages, the Rel'f Associations are refuested to withdraw their Agents, who have heretofore acted as travelling messengers. If the Re-lief Associations will establish agences in the rear of other armies, they may enjoy the the same privileges hereby secured to the Army of Northern Virginia.
