ROHAN POTATOES.

A NEW SPECIES.
FOR SALE, at the Post Office by P. Thornton. The Cultivator's account of them is as follows:
"This is a new and extraordinary variety, which has lately appeared in Switzerland, and has been cultivated in this country but two years; It surpasses all others in size and productiveness—is quite farina-cous and of excellent flavor."
Judge Buel, in the Cultivator, of November last, says: "We obtained two tubers from France last fall, and through the kindness of an esteemed friend, we have been enabled to increase our seed 12 pounds. We divided the tubers into sets of two eyes each, and we planted one set in hills four feet apart, in a piece of ground much shaded and rather low condition.—We dug, weighed and measured the crop on the 28th September. It weighed 525 pounds, and measured nine bushels. They are undoubtedly the most productive variety of potatoe we ever met with. The 3 tubers first imported, cost 45 dollars."
