## AN ORDINANCE

To prevent Hogs from, running at large within the Town of Camden.

1. Be it ordained by the Intendent and Wardens of the Town of Camden, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That from an latter the first day of December next, ensuing, it shall be deemed a nuisance for any bog to run at large within the limits of the said Town.

2. Be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That from and after the day fixed in the first clause of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Marshall and Constables of the said. Town, and the right of any person, to seize and secure, or kill and destroy, all Hogs found run-ning at large within the limits of the said Town, belonging to, or the property of any citizen or inhabitants of the said Town -and forthwith after such seizure, the said hog shall be sold or otherwise disdosed of, by the person seizing the same, and he shall pay into the Treasury of the Town Council, one-third of the value of such hog so seized, and retain the other two-thirds value thereof to his own proper benefit and use.

3. Be it further eracted by the authority aforesaid, That it shall be the duty of the Marshall of the said Town, from and after the day fixed in the first clanuse, toseize, secure and impound, any hog run-ning at large within the limits of the said Town, as an Estray, which may belong to or be the property of any person not. a citizen or inhabitant of the said Town. and to proceed forthwith to dispose of the same according to the Laws of the State respecting Estrays.

4. Be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That this ordinance shall not apply to Hogs being driven to mar-ket, in, or through the said town.

5. Be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That the Marshall shall pay hands of its present proprietor, who will a fine of ten dollars into the Town Treasury, for each and every neglect of duty under this ordinance, to be recovered before the Town Council, as other fines now

> 6. Be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, That all ordinances and parts of ordinances repugnant to, of inconsistent with this ordinance, be and are hereby repealed.
