### Extract from the 28th section of the Militia Law of 1841.

"Provided, That all Sergeants of companies, and all non-commissioned Regimental Staff officers who shall voluntarily attend an encampment in their respective Brigades, shall be exempted from road duty, during the year in which they shall attend such encampment. Provided also, That all Sergeants of companies, and all non-commissioned Regimental Staff officers, who shall serve seven years consecutively, and shall during the seven years, attend the encampments in their respective Brigades, shall thereafter be exempt from the performance of ordinary militia duty. And Provided also, That in case any such Sergeant or non-commissioned Regimental Staff officer, shall be promoted to the rank of a commissioned officer, his term of service necessary to exempt him from ordinary militia duty, shall be computed from the time of his appointment as a Sergeant or non-commissioned Regimental Staff officer. And it shall be the duty of all officers, whose duty it shall be to appoint Sergeants and non-commissioned Regimental Staff officers, to give them respectively a certificate, signed officially, specifying the appointment, its duty, and the company or Regiment to which they belong; which certificate, with proof of service, as required by this act, shall be evidence to claim exemption from militia duty herein specified."
