

less of that formality than set and premeditated debates generally have; and more of the deep earnestness and feeling which manifest themselves when men are in earnest, and feel on the subject they are discussing.

There were also some interesting questions in the House to-day.

First, A Resolution offered by Mr. Preston, of Virginia, to make the California and New Mexico Territorial Bills the special order of the day for Tuesday, the 30th instant, was passed, the rules being suspended to allow its introduction, almost without dissent. I can hardly imagine what this portends.

Second, Mr. Hilliard asked leave to introduce two bills, of which he had given previous notice; one to authorize the people of Upper California to form a Constitution and organize a State Government, preparatory to admission into the Union, the boundaries to be from 34.30 on the South, to 41.30 on the North, and between the Pacific on the West, and the Sierra Nevada on the East; and the other bill being to define the Northern boundary of Texas, as commencing where the parallel of 36.30 intersects the Eastern boundary, running along that parallel West, to the Sierra Nevada, along the summit of the Sierra Nevada South 31.30, then West along that parallel to the Pacific Ocean. The question on suspending the rules was taken with reference to this latter bill first, and it resulted ayes 60, noes 112, there being nearly two-thirds against the suspension instead of two-thirds in its favor, which is required to suspend the rules. The vote was a strictly geographical one, the Southern members for, and the Northern against, the motion, except the following: Messrs. R. W. Thompson, and W. Wick, of Indiana, Mr. Ficklin, of Illinois, and Mr. H. Williams, of Maine, voted for the motion, and the following four Southern members against it: Messrs. McKay and Venable, of North Carolina, Mr. Phelps, of Missouri, and Mr. Crisfield, of Maryland.

Subsequently to this Mr. Flournoy, of Virginia, moved to suspend the rules to allow him to introduce a bill, of which he had given notice, to retrocede the District of Columbia to Maryland. The vote on this motion, was—ayes 77, noes 114. This vote was more chequered. There were 60 Southerners and 17 Northern men in the affirmative, and 101 Northerners and 13 Southerners in the negative. The Northern men and who voted aye, are: H. Belcher, of Maine; D. P. King, of Massachusetts; Wm. Duer and H. C. Murphy, of New York; Charles Brown, of Pennsylvania; J. D. Cummins, R. Dickinson, Wm. Kennon, jr. and Wm. Sawyer, of Ohio; G. G. Dunn and R. W. Thompson, of Indiana; R. S. Bingham, of Michigan; O. B. Fickling, J. A. McClernand, Wm. A. Richardson, and John Wentworth, of Illinois; and Shepherd Lefler, of Iowa.

The Southerners who voted in the negative, are: J. G. Chapman, J. W. Crisfield, T. W. Ligon, R. M. McLane, J. D. Roman, of Maryland; (the whole delegation except Mr. Evans, who was not present); J. W. Houston, of Delaware; B. L. Clark, R. French, and J. B. Thompson, of Kentucky; F. P. Stanton, of Tennessee; W. F. Featherston and J. Thompson, of Mississippi; and J. A. Woodward, of South Carolina.

With the exception of a bill to provide for a settlement between the United States and Alabama in reference to interest on some advances made by the latter during the Creek war, and a bill for the relief of Captain Henry, which gives him two thousand dollars and two sections of land, for his gallantry in escaping from the Mexicans, and giving notice to General Taylor of Santa Anna's approach previous to the battle of Buena Vista, and which Major Gaines, of Kentucky, characterized as the achievement of the war; both of which bills were passed. No other business was done in the House, the remainder of the session being spent in committee of the whole on the General Appropriation bill, in which it would seem every member has some one, or from one to a dozen, darling appropriation he wants inserted.
