**DEVELOPMENTS.**—A Coroner's inquest was held on Friday last over the dead body of a negro, discovered in the lower edge of this District, near the Lexington line. The Jury in identifying the body, found it to be that of App or Appling, the slave of Martin Posey, charged with the murder of Mrs. Posey, who our readers recollect, was found dead a month or six weeks since, with marks of violence on her person. Suspicious circumstances attend the negro's death. His limbs were tied, and a ladder had been extracted from one of his ribs which had been broken—clearly indicating that he came to his death by a gun or pistol shot. Several persons have been arrested on suspicion of the murder—among them, Martin Posey, the master of the negro, a man by the name of Kirkland, and one by the name of Jones. Strong suspicions also attach to the two former for the murder of Mrs. Posey, the wife of Martin Posey.

It is understood that one or two of the parties have made important confessions. This is likely to prove a horrible tragedy! But we leave it to a judicial investigation.

**FIRE IN COLUMBIA.**—A fire broke out in the store in the rear of Price and Berry's Furniture Store last night about half past nine o'clock, which, if it had not been promptly subdued by the energy and skill of our Fire Companies, aided by the citizens, would have done great damage.

The entire range of stores in front, was in imminent peril, and only saved by the untiring efforts of the firemen.

The fire originated in a wooden stable which with the adjoining building was entirely consumed. Messrs. Price and Berry will, we fear, suffer considerable loss, having removed all their furniture into the street.—Telegraph.

**CURIOUS INSURANCE CASE.**—Two gentlemen of this city, who we shall designate as Mr. K. and Mr. S. agreed to import together two cows from England, and Mr. K. was to have his choice in the event of their safe arrival.—The cows were ordered, and Mr. S. as was his custom, wished to effect insurance on his property, and desired Mr. K. to make a joint insurance with him. To this Mr. K. objected, saying he would stand his own underwriter. Mr. S. therefore proceeded to effect insurance and was told that he must designate one or the other of the cows on which the insurance should attach. He accordingly designated the elder of the two. On the arrival of the vessel it was ascertained that the elder cow had died. The question now arose how the remaining cow was to be disposed of. The parties could not agree, and the question was submitted to a referee. It was decided that Mr. S. was entitled to the amount of the insurance on the deceased cow, and to half the surviving cow.—Boston Advertiser.

**ROMANTIC.**—It is stated that a marriage of rather a romantic character took place at Lockland, a village about twelve miles from the city on the Miami Canal. The daughter of a prominent citizen was betrothed to an industrious young mechanic, but she not being past "sweet sixteen," the parents opposed the wedding. The objections were removed by a compromise. The nuptials were celebrated, and in an hour the young bridegroom took leave for California, thence to return in two years and claim his bride.

**THE WHEAT CROP.**—The Southern Recorder, of Tuesday, says: "The wheat crop, from our accounts, throughout Georgia are very forward, and usually promising. This is very pleasant news; it will relieve any deficiency, we trust, in the corn supply, created by the unusual quantity of the latter articles required to make pork, from our prolonged spring weather during the winter months."

**GRAFTING THE STRAWBERRY UPON THE ROSE.**—The gardener of Mr. James Rothchild.—M. Coquillard, has succeeded in grafting, by "approach," the runners of strawberry on eggplant and monthly roses. Many specimens of grafting were in the last exhibition of the Paris Horticultural Society, and many more are on sale by the Paris florists. These grafts attract much attention, but such things are by no means new; the tomato is grafted on the potato—the artichoke upon the teasle—tobacco on the mullen; the melon on the cucumber, &c. All are plants of the same family, as well as the strawberries and rose; but the ill assorted union are of a short duration, for, after some weeks of this common life, each separates from the other, leaving a dead and often incurable wound.

**TERIBLE RAVAGES OF THE CHOLERA.**—The Macon (Geo.) Messenger of the 4th inst., has been favored with the perusal of a letter, post-marked at Cote, Louisiana, and dated on the 7th of February, which gives the most melancholy, heart-rending intelligence in regard to a company of emigrants from Monroe county, Ga. The party, consisting of thirty four whites and forty three negroes, left Monroe Co., early in January, for Texas. There were in all six families, viz:—James G. Powell, wife and eight children; Lewis Covart, wife and seven children; Jephtha V. Walker, wife and five children; Mrs. Jones and her two sons and two daughters; Mrs. Hill, Henry Hill, and Miss Rebecca Hill.

The party proceeded in safety until they reached New Orleans, where they embarked on board a steamer, to proceed up the river to some point convenient to their proposed place of future residence. On the second day Mr. Covart was taken sick with cholera, and died in a few hours. His comrades and family landed to perform the last sad rites of burial, when the entire company were prostrated with the disease in its most malignant form. Mr. Covart, his youngest child, and a nephew by the name of Wright, were among the earliest victims. Mr. James G. Powell is also among the dead. At the latest advices, eighteen of the company had been buried; seven negroes in one grave! Some of them died in three hours after they were taken! At the time the letter was written, the company had remained at their camp for ten days, and most of the sufferers were convalescent. They hoped to resume their journey again in a day or two.
