No servant in public or private houses in any of the Free States are so trustworthy, or so kind or respecsful, as these "poor miserable slaves." And why should they not be? for here a negro is treated with kindness and respect, but as a negro, and not eleva ted to the level of a white man. How is it at the North? There he is constantly told that in everything but his color he is equal to his "white brother," but in all their actions the said white brother takes care to impress it upon the "man of color" that he is not a white man, and never will be treated as one. The consequence is he is discontented and unhappy, and sighing for freedom from his degraded position in society ten times more earnestly than Closes " slaves sigh for freedom in the South. Why then would you abolish-not slavery,

as you view it, for it is not here-but the condition of things that enable a few whites to superintend and manage a large number of negroes, and cause them to labor and provide for their own comfortable support, in a far better manner than they would do if freed from that superintedence and management of a superior

Abolish it you cannot. Change it you may, but only to put it in a worse form. The rice swamps of South Carolina, and the sugar fields of Louisiana, and the Broad acres of cotton in all the Southern States, that never have been cultivated by any but negro laborers, never will be; and there, as long as these lands continue to be cultivated, the negro will be a slave to the white owner, call him by what name you will; and never nill his condition be better than it is now.

Why then will you continue to agitate the subject, unless you are determined to dissolve the Union? You have called, and are daily calling, as good men as ever lived, by all the vile names that the copiousness and billingsgate of the English language can furnish, merely because he calls the negro slave, instead of "brother," until you have goaded their high born spirits to the last point of forbearance; and unless you cease the irritation that you have so long persevered in, the days of this Union are numbered. "A house divided agains: itself cannot stand."

I write to you in the spirit of brotherly kindness, to beg of you to pause and reflect. I have no interest to prompt me to advocate the cause of the South, but I know her people well, none that posseses all the attributes of good men, than do a large majority of those that you denounce as "Inhuman monsters," "trafficher: in human flesh and blood," and "unworthy to associate with freemen," because they continue peaceably to exercise the right that yourgancesters accorded to them, and to cultivate the land, that their insalubrious climate will not allow them to cultivate themselves, by slave la-
