ney have been expended to bring it into action. The Government has granted him a patent and I think that same Government should sustain. him. If the power that he pretends to grant patents does not protect the inventors, then indeed may genius cease to benefit the world with its splendid results.

The Baltimore and Southern Packet Com-pany, or stockholders in it, held a meeting last night and resolved to wind up the affairs of the Company by a distribution of the funds received from the sale of the steamer Republic. The par value of the stock is to be immediately paid to each stockholder, and whatever remains thereafter to be paid to each stockholder in the course of a month. A very handsome dividend will be declared. - Charleston Courier.

SOUTHERN ACTION .- The demonstrations which have been made at the South have produced their effect. Witness the meetings which are taking place in the Northern States. However far they may fall short of doing us justice, they show that our firmness here, with all the apparent divisions which exist among us, have roused them to some sense of the wrongs done.

The papers which have cried down agitation at the South, and opposed all action, are now pointing to those meetings and saying, "Did we not tell you all along that the conservative men of the country would save the Union." This is the course they take now about meetings at the north, which are the result not of their course, but of those who have defended the South in a firm and resolute manner, which could not be mistaken by our enemies.

Let the South continue to speak and act as she should-let her not falter and give way for a moment, and, in that way, and that alone, can she find redress and safety .- Aug. Republic.

FRELING IN MICHIGAN. - The following is an

extract from a Michigan paper:
"REPEAL! REPEAL!—We notice that petitions very numerously signed have already been presented in the Legislature, asking for such action as will relieve our delegation in Congress from the Wilmot Proviso instructions passed at the last session. These petitions, being the spontaneous impulse of the people, show in what estimation the action at Lausing last winter in this regard is held by the masses, The absolute necessity of repeal has not been seen and felt by the people until now; and when it is evident that the Union is in danger, unless a compromise of the slavery question is effected, a movement in favor of retroaction by the Legislature is not only very natural, but will become very general, unless there be immediate legislation in accordance with public sentiment.

"In this county-and we speak within bounds when we say it-eight-tenths of the people are in favor of leaving our delegation in Congress untrammelled on the slavery question. On Friday last a petition to this effect was started in this village, and in a few hours some two hundred voters had signed it, and among these were some thirty whigs and third-party men. More petitions will follow from this immediate vicinity; and we trust that the patriotic in every section of the State, will see to it that the Legislature is properly advised of the public sentiment on this question."
