New England rum. SAN FRANCISCO, 17th Feb. 1850. I affi in this wonder of the world, and it is

the wonder of the world sure enough. I land-cd here on yesterday, 4 o'clock P. M. Julius Pringle in Port 24 hours ahead of us, sailed from Valparaiso same day, January 2d. She goes up to Sacramento City with her cargo, being a better market than this; sails on Tuesday 19th, I go up in her. The Company there will sell vessel and cargo, break up and all go to the mines; each on his own book. Albert, Augustas and myself will probably stick together, that is as friends for mutual assistance in case of necessity. Albert says that you must hold your temper, keep quiet, and not get into a flurry about coming to this country, until you have some advice from him, he does not write now-says you may be arranging your business in such a way as to be able at short warning to come out here, or remain and go on as usual there, as he may think best after having been here long enough to advise. They are all well. Neither of us have a scratch of a pen from home or anywhere else, which you may judge is no small disappointment. The last steamer from Panama brought no mail-latest dates from the States here 15th Dec. 49. This is a great country, I can scarcely believe my own eyes, to see what is just here, and this is not more than a drop in the ocean to what I expect. All that I can say is that I am now prepared to believe all that can be said as to the flattering prospect of this country, in the hands of energetic, industrious, persevering men. We want no chicken-hearted old grannies here; those who come here must be ready cocked and primed for any thing that comes to hand. I wrote the Camden Journal from Valparaiso, 29th Dec., also my family. When you go to Lancaster call and see my family. Tell them Lemmond is all right, and not to give themselves any unnecessary trouble after me, for I am in California, and intend to make something this time, or be found trying. I am no brag-nor have I yet seen so much, but I have seen enough to convince me that I can make money here if I live and keep my health. You must excuse this short, unsatisfactory scrall-all I have time now to say is, that the gold stories in the news-papers are not all humbug. Do not expect to hear from us often, time is precious here, \$1 per hour, that's the talk old fellow. We shall have no time to write only of Sundays, and then you know we must go to church, wash our clothes and bake enough bread to last all next week, now how much is left to write long yarns. We all have a large amount of baggage, more

Icather an possibly get to the min ave to store it here at \$1 per month on the trunk, chests and boxes \$1,50 per month. I am perfectly disgusted with all Companies, as none, as yet, do do do have done anything but fight and quarrel about their shares until the whole is spent, which does not take very long here. This, I hope, will not apply to the interest of the Julius Pringle Company, as they are unanimous for going up the River to Sacramento City, there sell out stock, lock and barrel and each cut his own Fodder. April 23. The vessel is just the size and rig that is wanted for this trade, and will sell well. I am possitively ashamed to undertake to write even the one-tenth part of what I see, for I am sure you all would think I was lying. Tell Caston I will write him and all the rest of my friends, from the mines, when I have been up and seen the elephant; let him have the benefit of this letter. There are at least 300 vessels in port, and not one out of ten will ever get away; many are used as store ships. Some few are chang-ing hands, worth 30 or 40 thousand dollars, selling for 3 or 4 thousand. I have seen plenty of pieces of gold to-day as large as my fist-and it is said that there is a piece lately found and on the way to this place, weighing only 92 pounds ; there are men of veracity here that have seen it. The most perfect law and order prevail here; they say that there is no place in the world that will compare ry chean with the mining population for peace and good order. Each man is attending to his own business instead of his neighbors, and making for-tunes at it. My next, I hope, will be from a Jan. 23 rich hole in the diggins up to my eyes in gold dust. Farewell for the present. W. J. LEMMOND.


