Wallace of this State to his constituents, in the following complimentary language: "THE RIGHTS OF THE SOUTH.—Gen. Wallace, of the first Congressional District of South Carolina, has lately addressed to his constituents an interesting and able letter on the absorbing topic of the day. The sentiments it expresses are worthy of the noble son and representative of that brave and gallant State—worthy of the better days of the Republic, and worthy of the earnest attention of every man who values the liberty and institutions of the South. We regret that we have not space for the publication of the whole of this eloquent and many address; but we furnish below the concluding portion of it, which presents in sombre colors the prospects and future destinies of the South. Let every one read it and determine for himself whether he will unite with our most approved good masters at Washington in rivering the claims which they are preparing for them."

THE KENTUCKY BLOCK.—The State of Kentucky will contribute a block of its own native marble for the National Washington Monument. It will be eight feet long, four feet broad, and from eighteen to twenty inches thick. Inscribed upon it will be the arms of the State, and the appropriate and patriotic motto directed by the General Assembly: "Under the auspices of Heaven and the precepts of Washington, Kentucky will be the last to give up the Union!"

AMALGAMATION IN BOSTON.—At the great National Celebration of the Sons of Temperance on the 12th inst., at Boston, in which twenty-three States were represented, the Southern Division were insulted by the introduction of negro Cadets of Temperance. The Southerners very sensibly left the parade to the Amalgamationists, and retired from the procession.
