A letter from Rio Grande city, says that the In-Kians are formed in three divisions; one will descend the Nueces to Corpus Christi; the second, will advance on Brownsville; and the third will take the Mexican side of the Rio Grande,

NEW ORZEANS, July 10. The steamship Ohio has arrived from Havana, with dates to the 6th The Contoy prisoners were still in confinement, and their fate undecided.

From the City of Mexico dates have been received to the 25th. The Cholera was raging with increased violence, the deaths amounting to 300 daily.

The brig Somers has arrived from Charleston, and the brig Josephine from Savannah.

WASHINGTON, July 14. The funeral of the President yesterday was marked by a solemnity and magnificence, surpassing any previous pageant. Business was entirely suspended throughout the city.
