

TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

From the Charleston Mercury. WASHINGTON, July 11. LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET.—Brown and Shipley's Circular states that Cotton has advanced 1-2; Fair Uplands and Mobile, 7 1-2; Fair Orleans, 7 3-4. Sales of the week 65,000 bales, of which 22,000 were taken by Speculators, and 10,000 for export. The stock on hand is 520,000 bales.

A great explosion occurred at Banus, by the blowing up of a powder magazine. One thousand lives were lost, and thirty boats were blown up.

NEW YORK, July 11. The Cotton market to-day was firm, the sales amounting to 1000 bales, at unchanged prices. Flour and Wheat are dull.

Advices from Santa Fe have been received, announcing the formation of a State Government by New Mexico, and that an election for State Officers will take place on the 20th. Mrs. White's child has been delivered up by the Utah Indians to the Apaches alive.

NEW ORLEANS, July 9. The hostile demonstrations on the Rio Grande have occasioned much alarm and excitement, and families are abandoning the settlements. A letter from Rio Grande city, says that the Indians are formed in three divisions; one will descend the Nueces to Corpus Christi; the second, will advance on Brownsville; and the third will take the Mexican side of the Rio Grande.

NEW ORLEANS, July 10. The steamship Ohio has arrived from Havana, with dates to the 6th. The Contoy prisoners were still in confinement, and their fate undecided.

From the City of Mexico dates have been received to the 25th. The Cholera was raging with increased violence, the deaths amounting to 300 daily.

The brig Somers has arrived from Charleston, and the brig Josephine from Savannah. WASHINGTON, July 14. The funeral of the President yesterday was marked by a solemnity and magnificence, surpassing any previous pageant. Business was entirely suspended throughout the city.

From the Charleston Evening News. WASHINGTON, July 12. At the President's house, gentlemen had their pockets picked of four thousand dollars. The doors of the East Room were locked, for the purpose of searching all present. The people were indignant, and broke open the doors. There was great excitement. The corpse of Gen. Taylor was in the same room.

WASHINGTON, July 13. A magnificent funeral procession is forming, over a mile in length, with an immense concourse of people. Minute guns are firing, bells tolling, and the old gray horse walking next to the coffin.
