THE HIGHWAYMAN AND HIS COUN-

SEL. A tall, gaunt man, wrapped in a loose horseman's coat with a handkerchief from which the tips of his ears peeped, red like 'the rosy morn.' with a ferocity of whisker and an obliquity of vision, and a deep scar on his cheek, in a gruff voice thus addressed me :

'Measter, I a'cum for that five pound.'
