Since that event, the Northern detectives have been steadily engaged in tracking the thief, but have only recently succeeded in spotting him. He had purchased a plantation near Edisto, and was living in the full enjoyment of his ill-gotten wealth when surprised by the detectives.—*Charleston News.*

SENTENCE OF REV. T. S. ARTHUR. It was mentioned in our columns, a few weeks since, that an Ecclesiastical Court had convened at this place, for the trial of Rev. T. S. ARTHUR, formerly pastor of Christ Church, Greenville, for unministerial conduct. The Court was in session several days, and for both the prosecution and the defence counsel appeared.

We are informed there were nine specifications to the charge. Of these the accused was found guilty of one. The sentence of the Court is—five years' suspension from ministerial labor. Mr. ARTHUR has this been officially notified, as we are informed by a friend who saw the official documents.—*Greenville Mountain.*

FOREIGN IMMIGRATION.—Under the authority conferred upon him by the Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature of this State, for the encouragement of European Immigration, his Excellency Governor ORR, has appointed Messrs. W. J. FERLOW, F. MELCHERS and THOMAS P. RYAN, Agents of the Immigration Bureau, and commissioned them to establish themselves in such parts of Europe as will best enable them to carry into successful execution the provisions of the Act. From an intimate personal acquaintance with all of the appointees, we are enabled to congratulate the State upon being represented in this matter by capable and efficient officials. It is understood that they will enter at once upon the discharge of their responsible duties, and we hope that the fruition of their labors may be evidenced before the close of this year, by the influx of a class of population from European shores, which has already made large contributions to the material and social prosperity of this State.—*Charleston Courier.*

ANOTHER INDIAN MASSACRE is announced. Fort Buford, in Dakota Territory, at the point where the Yellow Stone falls into the Missouri river, was garrisoned by eighty soldiers, under command of Colonel BARKER. Hostile Indians had for some time been seen in the neighborhood, and recently a force of from 2000 to 3000 of them surrounded the fort, and, after a severe contest, in which the Indians were several times repulsed, the garrison was overpowered and every man put to the knife. Colonel BARKER, his wife and child are among the victims. It is thought that the Colonel shot his wife to prevent her being captured. It is reported that 300 Indians were killed and nearly 1,000 wounded. This, and the massacre some time ago at Fort Phil Kearney, show that the savages on the frontiers are thoroughly hostile.

ANOTHER MEETING.—The colored people of Charlotte, N. C., held a meeting on last Saturday night, to select delegates to a convention to be held in Raleigh. The *Guardian* says:

"All spoke in a conciliatory manner, showing a strong disposition to gain the aid and counsel and good feeling of our white citizens. We were struck with the remarkable good logic and sound advice of some of the speakers to their colored friends, and if they will but follow the advice given, much good must result therefrom. One speaker said he had worked hard since he has been free than he ever did while in slavery, and argued that it was the duty of his race to work—that freedom did not give the right to be idle, but the right to provide for one's self by his own free will. Indeed, all the speakers gave good advice."

NEW YORK, April 5.—The steam ship Alabama has arrived with Vera Cruz dates to the 23d ultimo.

Vera Cruz was in a state of siege. Sixteen hundred men with five pieces of artillery were inside. Provisions were high. There was no blockade on the place from the sea-side. The besieging army numbered thirty-five hundred men, and had four small Napoleon guns, but more guns and men were expected. Maximilian was in Queretaro with ten thousand men, but had neither provisions nor money. The Liberals were besieging Yucatan.

"The tobacco now on hand in the counties of Halifax, Pittsylvania, Franklin and Henry in Virginia, and Rockingham and Caswell, in North Carolina, is estimated to be worth \$12,000,000. The crop of Pittsylvania alone is placed at \$3,000,000. These estimates are based on careful researches.
