#### AGRICULTURE.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

From the Abbeville Press.

STONY POINT, February 17, 1869. Dear Lec: If success will result from repeated appeals, I propose again urging upon the planters of the District the policy, indeed the necessity, of reviving our Agricultural Societies. The proverbial wisdom of a multitude of counsellors is applicable to no vocation in life more truly than to the ecience of agriculture. A Crusoe may construct a "dag out," and his man Friday build snares for wild game, but no isolated individual ever fully de veloped the agricultural resources of his own farm. Association of ideas and of men, concert of action, and practical knowledge, are all necessary to secure the farmer success; and never before in the history of our State has the lack of these incentives been so sorely felt by our planters as at pretent. If emancipation has imposed multiplied responhis theory and practice of plantation economy. The idle time of a slave was an imperceptible loss to his master; the increasing number and value of slaves compensated for ragged farming; the corn crib, smoke house and hand loom secured to the planter of old an independence no where else to be found : indeed, the owner of slaves was his own insurer, and cared nought for the outside world.

Not so now. Labor is scarce because confined principally to males; and is best controlled where best remu nerated; to supply this deficiency, a demand arises for improved implements; experience teaches us it does not pay to raise "razor backs," and hence the demand for improved breeds of porkers; from the same lesson we learn, that togrow corn to feed mu'es and hogs doesn't pay, and hence the necessity of devoting a larger area to small grain; the high price of cotton urges the planter to cultivate more land, and instead of reclaiming worn land stimulates him to fell our virgin forests, thus impoverishing instead of enriching the country.

Now, the vital question to my mind is how are all these charges to be met, and successfully practiced without detriment to the country? Only, I think, by an interchange of ideas, and this interchange can only be effected by the revival of our agricultural societies.

There are men in our District who still adhere to the ante bellum system of farming, who are going behind every day; whilst there others, who taking advantage of the progressive tendency of things, keep up to every advancement in the science of agriculture, and are rapidly rebuilding their lost fortunes. During the past six months I have seen men, who harvested barley at the rate of twenty-five bushels per aore, sell the grain readily at two dollars per bushel, while others were enquiring, "what is barley good for?" It was good to sell to say the least of it, then why not grow it extensively? I have, too, seen men sell their wheat for two dollars per bushel, while others as easily sold for three dollars, because their grain was superior. Again I have seen men hunting purchas. ers for their milch cows at \$15 and \$20 per head, while I've known others to sell easily and readily at \$50 and \$75 per head. Again, I saw a farmer not long since with thirty-one pigs a fornight old offering the lot for \$50, whilet I knew |

another to sell ten pigs of the same age for \$100 cash. Now, these are but single instances of what is occurring in our vicinity daily, and yet the ren unerative side of these sales is confined to but a few of our planters. Why cannot each and every planter and farmer in the District command such prices for his stock and grain? It is simply because he has not the right kind, and in many instances does not know that such cases occur in the District.

Re-establish our agricultural societies and specimens of every kind of an imal, vegetable and manufactu ed pro duct will be exhibited, a laudable emu lation will be created, exploded notions will be abandoned, ---- uprooted, and the planting interests of the country so excellency developed as to guarantee success in the present, and presperity in the future.

SAVING MANURE.-Every man of common sense must admit that the rules to be adopted for a rational system of saving manure, must be based upon this process; and we may lay down the following ru'es in relation to it :

1st The ground selected for the disposition of stable manure should be even, in order to permit the equal distribution of the manure on it, and thus secure the heap uniformity in thickness. Only in this case the process of putrefaction will proceed regularly in every part of the hear, and its body prove of homogeneous character.

2d. The manure should be protected against the direct rays of the sun, in order to prevent the too rapid advance of the putrefactive process and a consequent generation of heat, which will incur a considerable loss of ammonia.-Practical experiment made with equal weights of stable manure exposed to the sun, and with that under cover, show the effect of the latter to be, within a certain time about twenty-five per cent. greater than the former.

3d. The manure heap should be moderately moist; if it be too dry the degree of heat then produced will volatize aumonia; if too wet an acid humus will sibilities upon the negro, so has the be formed, which, being soluble in watransition from master to employer ex- ter acts very injuri usly on vegetation. acted of the planter radical changes in In order best to a tain this end, the ground should be slightly inclined, and all the fluid that runs from the heap be collected in a pit, and from time to time scattered over the heap.

> A RECIPE WORTH ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS.—The Ohio Cultivator says the following recipe is worth one thousand dollars to every housekeeper: Take one pound of sal soda and half a pound of unslacked lime and put them in a gallon of water, boil twenty minutes, let it stand till cool, then drain off and put in a small jug or jar; soak your dirty clothes over night, or until they are wet through, then wring them and rub on plenty of sorp, and in one boiler of cloth s well covered with water, add one teacupful of the washing fluid; boil half an h ur briskly, then wash them thourghly with some suds; riuse, and your clothes will look Setter than by the old way of washing twice before boiling. This is an invaluable recipe, and every poor, Dec, 31. tired woman should try it.-
