Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Town Council of Orangeburg, and it is hereby On Line 1 to the authority of the same

Sec. 111. Be it further Ordained, That every Person, Pirm, Company or Corpora tion engaged in any Trade, Business or Profession hereinafter mentionel shall obtain on or before the 1st day of May A. D. 1877, a License therefor in manner herein provided: Ist. Those commencing business after

the 1st April A D 1877, shall obtain a License before entering upon that basiness 2d Every Person, Firm, Company o orporation required by this Ordinance to obtain a License to engage in any Trade Business or Profession for which a License crequired shall register with the Town Terk or his Az-istant, his or her name or style, and in case of a firm or company their names or styles of such firms or companies, and their places of basin as. 2d. Their trade, business or profession for which a Liceuse is required.

4th. The place where such trade, business or profession is to be carried on; all of which, and answer to questions relative to which, shall be given under oath.

Sec. IV. If any person or persons shall exercise or carry or any Trade, Business or Profession for the exercise carrying or or doing of which a lisence is re-quired by this or linance without taking out such license as in that behalf required he, she or they shall besides being liable for the payment of the license, be subject to a penalty not exceeding twenty (20) dollars, to be sued for and collected in any court of competent jurisdiction, one fourth of the penalty after deducting expenses of prosecution to be paid to the person who first informs of the matter and things whereby the penalty is recovered, the oth-er three-fourths to the benefit and use of the Town, and to be imprisoned for a term not more than twenty days, for each and every violation of this ordinance.

SEC. V. In every license to be taken out under or by the authority of this ordinance shall be contained and set forth the purpose Trade, Business or Profession, for which such License is granted and the name or place of business of the person or persons aking out the same. ()

Sac. VI. The Town Clerk shall prepare a proper form of License to be issued in each case which License shall be kept by the person receiving the same in a conspi-cious place as the Town Clerk may direct, SEC. VII. A License granted after the 1st day of April A. D. 1877 shall continue in force until the 1st day of April A. D. 1877 and all licenses granted after the 1st day of April 1877 shall be issued upon the the payment of a rateable proportion of the

whole amount of money imposed for such License provided however that no License be granted for less than three months though the time at the end of the year be less than that.

Sec. VIII. Each License granted shall be dated on the 1st day of the month in which the liability therefor accrues and the amount to be paid therefor shall be com-puted therefrom until the end of the year: and every person exercising or carrying on any trade, business or profession shall keep said License in their possession, and unless they shall do so shall be deemed and taken to have no License, and it shall be the duty of the Town Marshal and Detective Force to report any violation thereof.

Upon the removal of any person or persons from the house or premises at which the trade, business or profession mentioned in such was athorized it may and shall be lawful for the Town Clerk te authorize by endorsement of such License, the person removing as aforesaid to any other place in the corporation to carry on the trade, business or profession specified in such License at the place to which such person may have removed . T. Sec. X. For a License to carry on any

trade, business or profession hereitafter mentisned shall be paid to the Town Clerk

need, prior to May 1, 1877, and WITHCUT FURTHER NOTICE. Special Tax Stamps will be transmitted by mail only on receipt from the person or firm ordering the same of specific directions so to do, together with the necessary postage stamps or the amount required to pay the postage. The postage on one stamp is three cents and on two stamps six cents. It it is desired that they be transmitted by registered mail, ten cents additional should

accompany the application.
