**WM. GILMORE SIMMS' MONUMENT.**

A few years ago some of the admirers and friends of the late Wm. Gilmore Simms, in Charleston, determined to erect a monument of a befitting character over the grave of South Carolina's greatest novelist and historian. An association was formed with the Hon. W. D. Porter as President. About \$1,500 was raised almost entirely in Charleston; and it was determined that the monument should consist of a bronze bust, surmounted on a granite pedestal. The granite in its rough state was contributed by a friend, without charge, and the bust was made in New York at a cost of about \$1,500. About \$800 of this has been paid, and there remains due about \$700, before the bust can be obtained from New York, where it now is. The granite has to be worked up in the proper shape, and this it is supposed will cost about \$800 more, making altogether \$1,500. At the Press Association in Charleston last week the Hon. W. D. Porter came before the Association and made an eloquent and forcible appeal to the members of the press, and through them to the people to raise this additional amount, and let the good work be completed at once.

After hearing the remarks of Mr. Porter, the matter was referred to a committee who made the following report, which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, no man whom the State of South Carolina has produced has illustrated and adorned, to the same extent, the life of a practical printer, editor and literary man, devoted to the history and civilization of our people, as Wm. Gilmore Simms; and whereas, a balance of \$1,500 is needed to pay for a suitable monument of granite and bronze, ordered by his admirers and now awaiting payment in New York. Therefore

Resolved, That this Association calls upon every editor in the State, as a committee of one, with authority to associate others in the good work, to raise at least fifty dollars in each county of South Carolina.
