Mr. William J. Jones, an old and esteemed citizen of Aiken county, died at his residence on Thursday last.

Since the burning of the Barnwell jail last winter, the prisoners of that county have been placed in Aiken jail for safe-keeping. This institution has only nine cells, and there are now confined within its walls thirty-six prisoners-four in each coll -two of whom are white and thirty-four colored. Four of these are murderers-two from Aiken and two from
