

On the night of the 26th ult. M. Emile Thomas was suddenly sent for by a Minister of Public Work, and superceded in his office by two civil engineers, and having been compelled to sign a resignation, was sent off in the custody of two agents of police, to Bordeaux, or the neighborhood.

The workmen demanded the reinstatement of M. Emile Thomas in his functions, and since that time the ruytel has beaten almost daily.

Large assemblages of workmen have been drawn together in various parts of Paris, but being kept in check by the overwhelming force both of regular troops and National Guards brought against them, all the efforts made to disturb the peace, have been abortive. The persons actually receiving the wages of the State cannot be fewer than 120,000. It is intended to draft a portion of those into the provinces, and thus break up the confederacy.
