By substituting the edict of an absolute unajority for the will of the people, as ascertained and recorded by the founders of the Republic, the federative principles of the government have in effect been subverted.—Power, realrained by, no limits but its own discretion; is now permanently lodged in the hands of an agency representing co-partners, whose welfare, would seem to depend on an arbitrary disposal of the rights and interests of their minority associates. Dissatisfied with its success in exacting humiliating tribute from one portion of the American family, and expending it among another, in order, by this two fold operation, the better to level the distinctions which, in their physical resources, nature had wisely created, it is now not only preparing to renew its acts of oppression and injury, but to furnish higher, and to only preparing to renew its acts of oppression and injury, but to furnish higher, and to the South more appalling, evidence of the omnipotance of its dominion. While the fanatic and the demagogue have fraternized for the purpose of pulling down some of the pillars of the Federal edifice, which they assort to be unnecessary to its preservation, it is superfinous to remind you, gentlemen, that on the entirety of the structure depends its value to one half the Confederacy. Whonever the citizens of the slaveholding States shall firmly believe that the Compact to which their fathers subscribed secures neither liberty are received. ther liberty nor prosperity to them or their posterity, it will be idle to waste time in conjecturing concerning the future. The result is already known. The head and heart of the patriot proclaim it. That period, in the solemn judgement of him who addresses you, is rapidly approaching. To be ready to meet it is a duty you owe to the State, the Union, and the cause of constitutional liberty. Of the two geographical parties to which

the crisis has given birth, we already behold the one enthusiastically resolving to execute its nefarious purpose; the other, calmly awaiting the progress of events, without an organized effort to disperse the portentous clouds that overshadow the political horizon. Relying on the justice of their principles; the express provisions and moral power of the Constitution; the enactments of Congress; on the glorious recollections of the past, and the bright ant cipations of the future; our citizens are reluctant to admit, that a disruption of the tie which unites the States is possible from any supposed cause of internal discord. Learnestly entreat you to consider this expectation a fatal delusion. The decree, it may be, is a ready registered, that no Southern freeman shall hereafter sit secure and happy under his own vine and fig tree. In this gloomy condition of affairs, the course of the Plantation States is plain. Constituting, from necessity, the conservative portion of the republic, they are admonished to cultivate among each other a spirit of comity and kindness; to discard all jealousies, as at once unnatural as they are mischievous; to contend with one another in moral, intellectual and physical developments: but, above all, to reouble their vigilance in guarding from pollution the precious heritage of a common ancestry. To their apathy and improvidence are ascribable the bold and reckless attempts now in operation to annihilate the Federal partnership, by converting sovereign communities into menial dependencies. So rapid has been the career of usurpation and of submission to it, that the South no longer aims to recover rights that it has lost, but to retain privileges which it yet enjoys.

There is still hope, however, that God, in

his mercy, will avert the doom which impends over our beloved country. Until the hour of trial, then, shall come, let her constitutional obligations be faithfully discharged by South

In the meantime, prepare for every emere traitor is not he who resists usurpation, but he who tamely submits to its demands. In your resolves, be temperate and discreet; but firm, resolute and united. While enlisting the co-operation and advice of your oppressed co-partners, he it your care to have the conviction seriously impressed on the public mind of the Union, that South Car-offina never will consent to meet in Federal council, except as a sovereign and an equal. Let it be known, that you count all dange light, when compared with the hazard of political degradation.
