Muj.W. W. Morris, commandant at Fort

Brook and at present the acting Indian agent for the eminoles, in the absence of Mr. Spencer, relived on the 20th inst., a white flag from the Incus by the hands of Phillipee, a Span-iard, riding at Sara Sota. Phillipee, startled by an grount of the murders at Pease Greek, left whothers the settlement at Sara Sota, but returning on the 18th inst. found his horse and proper untouched, and this flag attached to his do. It is made of white crane feathers, forming a small flag bound on it with a string of whitecads in a small piece of smoking tobacco, the sou used by Bow Legs, King of the Seminoles Phillipee's intelligence enabled him to rend he signification thus: "We desire peace, wisto communicate, smoke and hold a peace talk, rie left signs, stating the time the flag waspund, and that at full moon he would re-turnand started at once with the flag to Major

Fim the fact that not a sign of hostility has beefevinced since the attack upon the trading how of Kennedy & Darling, more than a month agoudded to the appearance of the flag, the opion is entertained that further outrages will note committed, unless proveked by our people and those engaged in the last outrage will GEORGE H. This opinion is strongthened by the fact that at it time the most exciting alarm occured, instel of two, fifty settlements could have been utaked simultaneously and those attacked simultaneously, and those engaged in thin have escaped as readily. This information was obtained by a friend during a recent wit to Tampa Bay, and may be relied upon, as thise best acquainted with all the particular futures of the case and the Indian character, as supposed to know more than others dependig ppon vague surmises or worse rumors. Ma-ir Morris was the old Indian agent. Mr. Spenor is the present one, but he is now absent .wo companies of volunteers under Capt. Dill ad Fisher were aucumped about two miles out fom Tampa Bay. The services had been offer-red to the Government, but Major Morris declined, having no authority to receive them.

There are only about one thousand Indians in the whole State, of which number only one condred and fifty are warriors.

More Morris will leave Tampa Bay on the Henry Clay for Charlotte's Harbor, with an intercter, to meet Bow-Legs, the Seminole chief, at

the full of the moon. The troops on their arrival encamped at

Fort Brooke, the commandant not deeming it necessary to send them into the interior until the council was held or outrages committed. Many of the poorer class of neighboring inhabitants came in to the Government quarters, saying that they are afraid of the Indians, and the Govern-

ment is obliged to support them.
It is thought that the Indians do not desire to have any war with the whites, as they appear to be much alarmed at the presence of troops in their region of country, and the pre-parations going forward. The Indians would much rather be bribed to leave the country than to fight, while the white population, feeling con-stantly insecure with the Indians in their immediate neighborhood, insist upon their leaving on some terms. The result will probably be the same as in many former instances; the Indians will be obliged to succomb to a superior force, and, quitting their old hunting grounds, take up their residence on the western side of the Missis sippi-river.

THE CASE OF BROWN .- Our readers are aware that his Excellency Governor Scabrook had extended the time of Brown's execution to the last Friday in this month. His indefatigable counsel has procured a further respite of two months. Brown is yet very feeble, from the effects of his broken leg, which improves slowly. A petition strongly signed, and we believe by all the jury who tried the case, was presented to the Governor, asking for a commutation of the punishment. His Excellency has not committed himself upon the petition, but granted the respite in consideration of the pris per's suffering condition. The other Brown, the accomplice, was discharged from jail on last Saturday, by order of Solicitor Fair - Camden Journal,
