REASONS FOR WHY .- The opponents of the State Bank seem at a loss for reasonable grounds for their endeavors to reseind the charter of that institution. The Winyah Observer adduces the following weighty argument -- firstly it is an anomaous spectacle of the State authorities pertinaciously upholding a State corporation, whilst it denounced any union between a bank and the federal government,"(i. c. -precept ex practice) secondly, "That the lobbying and electioneering for Directors is disgraceful to the State." These opinions the Carolinian endorses; we sup. pose lobbying in Congress, or in the Legislature for any effice, must be strong grounds for the abolition of an office and we also may infer that the authors and endorses of such arguments would not descend to aid in the disgusting spectacle of lobbying for one, if they were anxious to be clothed in authority. States.

There is one important provision the Legislature should adopt, an alteration of the Militia laws, so that inspections and reviews should be held at home and not eause troop and regiments to appear 60 or 150 miles from the residences of the members thereof. There is no greater tyranny in existence than the present militia and patrol laws of the State and the people cry aloud for redress.
