SCARCITY OF MACKEREL.-Notwithstanding the favorable reports received the first of the season, of a plenty of mackerel at the bay of Chaleur, our fishermen are having poor luck. Three vessels arrived here this week. One of them had a decent trip of poor mackerel, but reports that out of twenty vessels which came through the Gut with them, not more than two or three had full fares. Another vessel, which arrived yesterday, brought home short of one hundred barrels, and gives the same dis-couraging accounts. Out of a fleet of forty vessels which came through the Gut at the same time, not more than five had full fares, while some had as low as three and ten barrels .- Gloucester Telegraph.

The Lahore Diamond, known as the Koh-i-noor, or "Mountain of Light," one of the prizes of the Sikh war, has been brought to England, and presented to the Queen. Before it was cut it weighed nearly 300 carats, but the unskilful lapidary cut it down to 279, which leaves it still the largest diamond known. The Pitt Diamond weighs 130 carats, and the great Russian Diamond about 200. The value of the Koh-t-noor is unknown, but two millions sterling is mentioned as approximating to it.
