the tariff, remains to be seen.

Legislature of North Carolina

Our observation of the proceedings of the Legislature of this State, shows that the Representatives of the people are alive to the consequences of the repeated in-fringement of their rights by the acts of the General Government, and are disposed to ake such measures as will not only effectually prevent further encroachments, but emand that the South shall be placed on an equality with the North, and a guarantee given that our institutions shall be respected.

In a set of Resolutions offered in the Senate, on the 234 ult., by Mr. Shepard, it declared that the right to secode from the Union is "a right of self desence and protection which the people of North-Carolina have never surrendered, and never can surrender, with due regard to their own safety and welfare, and that whenever a majority of the people of North Carolina shall solcannly resolve that they cannot safely remain in the Union, it is not only their right, ut it is their duty to second and punish such of her citizens as refuse submission

to her will, as rebels and traitors.'

The closing Resolution says, that "the injustice done to the slave-holding States. by the late admission of California into the nion would never have occurred, had the South been united; we, thereto e, invite the co-operation of the shave-holding States, in demanding from the Government an adequate protection, for such slave pro-porty as may emigrate to any territory be-longing to the United States, or should it be more advisible, an equal division of such territory between the slave-holding States of the Union."

On the 28th ult in the same body, Mr JOYNER offered a set of Resolutions, which after deprecating a dissolution of the Union, declare it "nevertheless true, that the long/continued wrongs, and increasing aggressions made by the people of the North on the institution of Slavery, established in the Southern States, an institution guar rantied by the constitution of the United States, and over which they have not one particle of rightful control, are gradually weakening and undermining this attachment, and, if persisted in, must inevitably lead to the severance of ties which bind together the States of this Union."

Also, that "whatever difference of oninion may exist in regard to the rights of one or more States to secode from the Union, there can be no question as to the nate . right of every people, when the wrongs and oppressions of the Government become


