ROW IN A CHURCH-MINISTER ARREST-ED IN A PULPIT.—The associated Presby-terian Church, in Frankford Row, near Franklin-street, Kensington, was yesterday the scene of the most disgraceful proceeding which we have been call upon to chron-icle for a long time past. It appears that the congregation who formerly occupied the church have become divided among themselves, and the two parties have been quarrelling as to who shall have possession of the premises. Yesterday morning, at an early hour, some of the members called at the Kensington Station House, and stated that they desired a number of officers to be present in the church, as there would no doubt be trouble. They were inf rmed that it was a rather delicate matter to ar-rest persons in chuch, and a warrant was accordingly obtained from Ald. Shoemaker, for the Rev. John Lyon, on the charge

of inciting to riot.
At half past ten o'clock yesterday, servires were commenced by the Rev. John Lyon, but there being a disposition shown to create a fight by those who were opposed to this gentleman, officer Young of the Marshal's Police, walked up to the pul-pit and arrested him. This was the signal for a great excitement omong those in attendance and much confusion. The Rev. gentleman was taken to the Kensington lockup, accompanied by an immense crowd. He there had a hearing before Alderman Shoemaker, who held him in \$1,000 bail for a further hearing on the charge of inciting to riot.

After this proceeding, another person attempted to complete the services of the day, but he was interrupted by some poor halfwitted person, somewhat intoxicated, who rushed towards the pulpit with the intention of whipping this gentleman out. He was arrested by officer G. G. Rihl and conducted to the lockup, where he remained at a late hour yesterday afternoon .-- Philadelphia Pennsylvanian of Saturday. Sr. Louis, April 11.

NEW-YORK MONEY MARKET, April 11 --The probability of farther shipments of specie, coupled with the fact that over six millions have been exported since the first of January, had induced greater caution on the part of our more timid capitalists but has led to no change in current rates of interest. Silver change is again growing scarcer, but there are still considerable sums held by banks in the interior, which, being kept for security, and not for circulation, might be replaced by gold; it the present rates continue, much of this will be attracted hither, but the only feasible method of permanent relief, will be found probability in adopting gold as the sole standard of value, and taking a seignorage from the weight of the silver coin.

TUSCALOOSA, APRIL 10. ANOTHER FLOOD .- Since the earliest settlement upon its banks, there has probably never been so sudden and rapid a rise in the Warrior river, as that which occurred during the present week. On Monday night, the rise was about 26 fest in twelve hours, and on Tuesday, the river had reached a height only a foot and a half lower than the great freshet in February.
