REVOLVING SAILS .- The Liverpool papers record the invention, by Mr. T. Watson, of Manchester, England, of a new mode of rigging ships:

The principal feature in his invention is the introduction of a set of revolving sails, sixteen in number, something similar to the fans of a windmill, which are elevated on a wheel, and are attached to a sort of spindle. As soon as the wind touches these sails, they instantly set in motion the spindle, which, acting upon a very simple piece of machinery, propels a couple of paddles. The object attained are a greater speed by means of the paddles, and the advantage of sailing against a head wind .-This is a great improvement, as the sails can be pointed with ease to any part of the compass. Head or contrary winds are not recognised; a stiff breeze is all that is requisite to propel the vessel. The paddleboxes give the hull the appearance of a double bowed steamboat. He has rigged a model ship twenty-three feet long by six feet breadth of beam, according to this plan, for the purpose of testing its capabilities .--The inventor has secured a patent for his invention, and is sanguine of its success .--Should it succeed, it is said that it will cause a complete revolution in the present system of propelling vessels."
