must extensive and costly correspondence with his agent in Europe, transmitting, of course, his letters by private messengers, who went at the risk of their lives, and had to be paid proportionably, and who, of course, had to be amply furnished with money for emergencies. Every letter which Kossuth sent to Hungary cost him on an average \$500. The money that he raised here was, of course, easily absorbed by these expenditures, and with it, as we know, was spent a considerable sum belonging to his wife, which her relatives in Hungary sent to her for her own use, but which she gave to h r busband for his cause .-Kossuth left America penniless and in debt, as in 1849 he left Hungary, after two years' administration of the treasury of that rich kingdom.'
