These are all to be talken into the account, and we know not that we can render a better service now than to lay down general principles for the government of our correspondent--leaving him to make the application, and learn, by a few ginning the use of small quantities, say from one to three bushels to the acre, and increase the quantity as it may be ascertained to be necessary. Lime is considered to be an essential ingredient to the perfect production of all soils-being constantly needed by plants in all their parts, and performing other functions of great importance-such as lightening and mellowing stiff clays, neutralizing and decomposing injurious acid substan- con b ces, and holding in solution much ! valuable food for the plant. It exists in three forms, quick lime, hydrate or slacked time and air slacked tical chemist says: "If the soil be stiff and cold-if it is newly drained, containing much of acid organic compounds, or if there are tough obstinate grasses, it is best to apply quick lime or the caustic hydrate. In either of these conditions it has a most beneficial and energetic action. Cravats, Hkf's and Gloves-If caustic lime is applied largely to light soils, it may do harm by too rapidly decomposing the organic matter, usually scarce in soils of this description. In all such cases, and generally when it is not wished to produce such effects as the above, mild or air slacked lime is the best. The action of all varieties is invariably more marked and permanent upon drained or thoroughly dry lands. than upon that which is wet and swampy. All these various states of lime act not only upon the organic matter in the soil, but upon the inorganic also-decomposing certain indissoluble compounds, and bringing them into a state favorable to the sustenance of plants. Thus we see that this manure performs many

This may be brought up by deep ploughing; or is made available by drains, which permit the roots to go down. When applied as a top dressing it should in almost every case be mild; and also when used in composts, where animal manure is present."
