The town of Lewes has been thrown into great confusion for the past two days, on account of a fleet of lifty or more sail of fishermen, from Maine and Cape Cod, appearing in the harbour, and the riotous conduct of the sailors, it seems these vessels, for Indigestion, Dyspepsia, Jaundice, Liver Com some weeks past, have been fishing off the coast for mackerel. On Satur. Nature's Own Method, by Nature's Own tlay last they ran into the harbor, and on Sunday, some dozen or more of the men came ashore, and raised considerable disturbance in the town of Lewes. On Tuesday morning the vessels put to sea, but failing to discover the fishing grounds, they returned again the same afternoon. Angered and vexed with their disappointment, a large hody of the men marched up to the town, where they committed the most excessive acts of riot-ous behaviour. They made forcible en-trances hito private dwellings, frightening and insulting the female occusucceeded in driving them back to Torbade them from returning at their peril.

Shortly after sundown on Wednes-day evening the citizens were aroused to immediate action by the report, that one hundred and fifty fishermen were crossing the beach, threatening to attack and burn the town. The men all turned out, armed with guns, muskets and huge clubs. The windows and doors of nearly every dwelling were meantime, the assailants continued to from those of a bilious type, should make use which spans Lewes Creek, one hun- Liver Pills. dred and fifty yards from the town.
Here a skirmish ensued, in which the fishermen were driven back, with a few broken heads and bones.

By this time a posse of the citi-

zens had taken possession of a can non in front of Mr. Burr's Hotel, loaded it with grape shot, and upon the repulse of the fishermen, a volley was fired into them. The night was dark, and it could not be ascertained if any one was short.

The firing of the cannon served as a signal to the pilots off at the Breakwater. Several boat loads immediate ly came ashore, and joining the citizens, a pursuit was made after the repulsed assailants. Their rear was protected by a loaded swivel mounted on the bridge, with a slow match kept in readiness. The pursuing party, num-bering a hundred or more, armed with some sixty or eighty guns, quickly reached the beach, and discovered the fishermen had embarked for their vessels. The firing of the canon warned them that there is plenty of fight in the men of Sussex,

About twenty of the rioters made forcible entrance into the garden of Mr. Thomas Howard, and despoiled the promises of all the most rare exotics. Not content with committing this outrage upon the property of an unoffending individual, they turned upon Mr. Howard, and threw rotten eggs at him, and drove him from his garden. Another party entered the house of Dr. Hall, and insulted the females. The same party burst into

In the skirmish Mr. Wm. A. Mor. row had his leg severely hurt. Mr. Morrow, at one time, stood alone on the footway which extends across the beach, and with a single pistol he kept the whole party at bay.

The fishermen stole from the beach

several anchors, and all the loose property they could lay their hands on. When the disturbance first occurred, a despatch was sent off up the river for the revenue cutter to come to the assistance of the town, A message was telegraphed back that the cutter was unable to come on account of having no men with which to man the vessel. On Thursday and Friday nights patrols were stationed on the bridge and on the beach, where they placed their watch, to prevent the landing of any large body of the fishermen. The citizens have matters now so organi zed as to permit only one or two to land at a time, for the purpose of procuring provisions, and supplies of sea stores.

This arrangement will avoid the fishermen collecting in the town in any large body. With a telescope several small squads of the fishermen are now seen on the beach off the light-house, prowling about, and plundering the shore of all property of a moveable character. One of the citizens of the town informs me that he has a fine boat at the cape, and which he is anxious to obtain possession of, but dare not go in quest of his own

property, for fear of being attacked.

The affair, it is thought, will now terminate quietly, as the citizens have several hundred guns, ready for service at a moments notice, besides several cannon at hand, which only need loading to be prepared for use. The fishermen are apprised of these preparations for defence, and will hardly dare commit any further molestation.
