What was my astonishment you may imagine, to see in the principal papers the next day, that the Emperor and Empress, had not only been present but, were received, and frequently interrupted with the greatest enthusiasm-shouts of "Vive l'Empereur, Vive l'Imperatrice," etc. And this is the way that the press always reports their visits to Theatres, public institutions, appearance in the streets, &c., &c., while in fact it is extremely rare to hear one cry "Vive PEmpereur," although there is always a great crowd collected to see him pass when he rides out, which is due more to natural curiosity than to love or esteem.
