AN ORDINANCE.

Further to Regulate the Police of the Town of Sumterville. WHEREAS, the Ordinance now in force in the town of Sumterville for the regulation of the Police of said Town, have been found by experience insufficient to effect the suppression of unlawful trading with slaves, and other practices alike injurious to the citizens of the Town and the surrounding country: For remedy thereof.

It is ordained, by the intendand and Wardens of the Town of Sumterville, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same, That all slaves residing in the Town of Sumterville shall be required to carry tickets, certificates, cards, or other written evidence, under the hands of their owners, or persons having the charge of them, of their residence in the town, in order to entitle them to pass on Sundays and after night, until the calling out of the patrol or guard, by the ringing of the bell, or the beating of the drum, or a horn made of calling them out, as the Council shall order. And that, until otherwise ordered, the bell shall be rung, instead of the drum, as heretofore ordered.

And that all slaves and away from the town, on any Sunday, or on a Sunday or at night, before the calling out of the patrol or guard, shall be liable to be punished, as by the laws of the State provided, unless having such written evidence of their residence. And be it further ordained, by the authority aforesaid, That so much of Ordinance or Ordinances of force in the said Town, as ordains and enacts that free persons of color shall be taken up and punished with stripes or imprisonment only, for being found without a ticket, or being found in possession of corn, fodder, rice or peas, without a ticket, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

And be it further ordained, by the authority aforesaid, That no person of color shall carry on any traffic in the said town on Sunday, either in buying or selling; and any article of produce offered for sale by a slave or free person of color on that day, and every article of merchandise purchased by a slave or free person of color, on that day, except necessary medicine or food, whether with or without a ticket, shall be forfeited, and shall be liable to seizure by the marshal, the guard on duty, or any citizen to whom the same shall be known, and shall be disposed of as is directed in the third Section of the Ordinance entitled an Ordinance to prevent trading with negroes, passed the 4th day of February, 1852. And it shall be held sufficient evidence of such trading to authorize such seizure and forfeiture, if a slave or free person of color shall be seen coming out of a shop, or the premises connected with a shop, kept for the sale of merchandise, with any article of merchandise kept for sale in such shop.
