The British papers do not attempt to conceal the disappointment of their countrymen, who are beginning to keenly feel the sad effects of war in all de partments of trade. The government is putting forth the most stren ous exertions to restore confidence at home, by sending out mulitudes of troops and vast supplies of munitions of war, but it is all of no avail. The people are oiscouraged-they see a long and rainous war, accompanied by heavy taxation, before them, and nothing more plainty indicates the existence of this state of things than the falling off in public s curities, and the decline in cotton, breadstutis. clothes, and every other description of merchan rise.
