The above Institution has been in operation for seven years, for the first time in a Seminary, and for the last two as a University, established under a Legislative Charter granted in 1852.

This Institution, organized and conducted on the University plan, does not prescribe a routine of studies, but each young lady is assigned in the confidence of the Public, both in this and in other Southern States, has been gradual but continued, and the board of Trustees, and the present Faculty of Instructors who have been identified with it for years, are determined it shall continue to merit an increased patronage.

In locality, proverbial for morality, health, and frugality, recommends it to Parents and Guardians as the place for the education of their daughters and wards. Out of seven hundred pupils who have been taught in the Institution but a single death has occurred, and although the present year has been noted for the prevalence of disease throughout the country, there has not been a single case of serious indisposition.

Through the whole course, from the lowest to the highest classes, instruction in drawing is daily given, without extra charge; the course extending from the Rudiments to Linear and Perspective Drawing.

The Scholastic year consists of one Session, which begins on the First Wednesday in February, and terminates the 15th November. There is no vacation during the Session.

It is earnestly recommended that young ladies should enter at the beginning of the Session and continue to its close, so that they may have the advantage of a thorough course of instruction.

Pupils will be received at any time during the Session, and, except within a month from the Commencement, charged from the time of entrance to the close of the Session.

No pupil will be received into the institution for less than a half Session, unless she enter after the Commencement of the second half Session.

Board, including fuel, lights, &c., can be obtained in a number of respectable private families at from \$8 to \$10 per month.
