A CALL FOR HELP

The recent floods in the river valle ys of North and South Carolina destroyed hundreds of homes and devastated thousands of acres of farm lands, thus rendering homeless and destitute many, many people. In the mountainous sections the people lived principally in the valleys. Now their homes and crops, and in many instances the soil itself, are gone. The railroad service has been greatly crippled, and the roads are wash ed away in many places and buried by landslides in others.

The people in many sections have been 'reduced to actual want, and it is feared that some may starve before aid can reach them. Relief committees have been named, and the people are responding nobly to this call of these distressed ones. There is little chance that the fund will grow too large, however. This is a splendid opportunity for the people in this section to render aid to their fellowmen of another section who have suffered incomparably more from the recent disasters.

This paper will be pleased to receive and forward any amounts, large or small. If you are sure you will never be in need, you may be excused.

RAILROAD WAGES

Shall they be determined by Industrial Warfare or Federal Inquiry?

To the American Public:

Do you believe in arbitration or industrial warfare?

The train employes on all the railroads are voting whether they will give their leaders authority to tie up the commerce of the country to enforce their demands for a 100 million dollar wage increase.

The railroads are in the public serviceyour service. This army of employes is in

the public service—your service.
You pay for rail transportation 3 billion dollars a year, and 44 cents out of every dollar from you goes to the employes.

On all the Southern railroads in 1915, seventy-five per cent of the train employes earned these wages (lowest, highest and average of all) as shown by the payrolls-

A 100 million dollar wage increase for men in freight and yard service (less than one-fifth of all employes) is equal to a 5 per cent advance in all freight rates.

The managers of the railroads, as trustees for the public, have no right to place this burden on the cost of transportation to you without a clear mandate from a public tribunal speaking for you.

The railroads have proposed the settlement of this controversy either under the existing national arbitration law, or by reference to the Interstate Commerce Commission. This offer has been refused by the employes' representatives.

Shall a nation-wide strike or an investigation under the Government determine this issue?
