A GHOST-HAUNTED COMMUNITY. The Scene of a Tripple Tragedy Said to be

the Home of Perturbed Spirits. NEW HAVEN, February 25 .- The

residents of Killingworth, a quiet little town on the Sound, are very much exercised over a haunted house. On a lonely road near the centre of the town stands an old house of peculiar con-struction. It was in this mansion that, a decade ago, Mrs. Horace Higgins cut the throats of her three children while they were asleen. They were buried in the village charchyard, and although the other graves there are covered in summer with an abundant growth of grass, not a blade ever grows on the graves of the children.

Their mother was adjudged insane and

confined in a room overlooking the graves, and every night until she shed she would stand at the window gazing on the clock in the church tower near by, moaning and craving pardon for her

For many years the house had the reputation of being haunted, and it almost continuously remained tenantless until last summer, when the Ray family of Boston took it as a summer residence. The first night they slept there the two tenants were nearly scared to death by the apparition of a woman in white standing at their bedroom window. Loud and thearthly noises echoed through the house. The next night Mr. and Mrs. Ray say they saw the apparition and they promptly gave up the house. Recently only these facts were learned by the villagers and since then several weird sights have, it is said, been seen in the old mansion.

Wong Ching Foo, a Chinese lawyer from New York, who has been attending some court proceedings in St. Louis, is quoted as authority for the statement that the Chinese community in St. Louis has received what is alleged to be a genuine copy of an Imperial Proclamation, requesting that on or before the lifteenth day of the lifth moon of the present year (May 15) all subjects of he Tai Tszing Empire (China) now residing in the United States of America return home, and instructing them that upon application to their Consuls free transportation will be provided from any part of the United States to any part of the Chinese Empire, except the provinces of Toung Tung, whose cuizeus, because of superior numbers, are required to pay halt fare. The proclamabroadly intimates that the Chinese Government intends to speedily retaliate mon the American export trade and American residents in China for the long-continued outrages upon the Chiness in this country. This design, if carried out, will destroy an annual export of \$80,000,000 and expose 9,000 Americans to the terrors of imperial prosection.
