A Fighting Chance.

The Democrats certainly have a fighting chance at least for the next Senate. There are now forty-two Republican Senators, including Riddleberger, and thirty-four Democratic. Twenty-five Senators go out of office on the 3d of March next. Of these sixteen are Republicans and nine Democrats. Of the latter, seven have already been elected or are certain to be elected, namely, those from Delaware, Florida, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee and Texas, and it is almost certain that the Democrat from West Virginia will be succeeded by a Democrat. This leaves only one of the nine to be elected-one from Nevada-and he, unfortunately, will probably be succeeded by a Republican. Of the sixteen Republicans whose terms expire in 1887, eight certainly, namely those from Maine.
