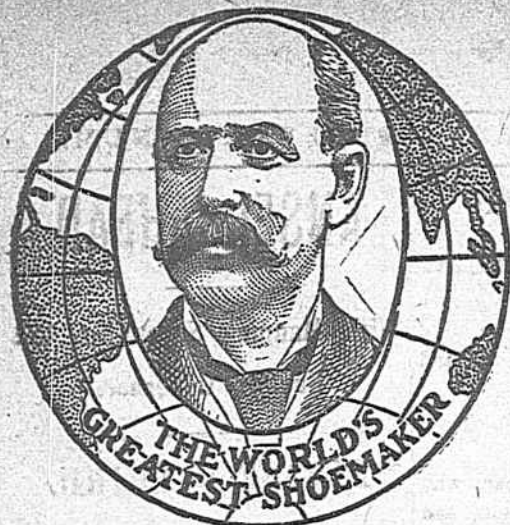

HE DENIES IT.

Repudiates Articles Published in The State Enquirer

ONE DAY LAST WEEK

Purporting to Give Substance of Conversation With York County Candidate on Train. Called Up The Record to Make Instant Denial.

Did Major Wylie, of the board of directors of the state dispensary, say that the other members of the board are corrupt; that he is only one man against two, and cannot help himself, but was able recently to compel the others, by threats, to return goods purchased over his protest?

In a long distance, telephone conversation Thursday morning with a Columbia Record man, whom he called up, Major Wylie denied the allegation that he had made such statements, and authorized the newspaper man to quote him as strongly in denial as his command of the language would permit.

Major Wylie's statement to the Record was by way of reply to the following article, which appeared Thursday morning in the Columbia State and credited to the Yorkville Enquirer: "Mr. Wylie, of the state board of dispensary directors, was on the C. & N. W. train Wednesday morning, going toward Gastonia; and between Yorkville and Clover he said in the presence of Dr. J. E. Massey and Mr. F. P. McCain, who were going to Clover with the county campaign party, that the state dispensary has always been corrupt and it is as corrupt as it has ever been. He said that the state board is corrupt; but he is only one man against two and cannot help himself. He cited that recently, over his protest, the other two members of the board has purchased two thousand cases of so-called case whiskey. Upon the arrival of the whiskey he, Wylie, insisted on having it analyzed. The analysis showed 24 per cent. of alcohol and the balance was various kinds of chemicals. As a result of the analysis, and Mr. Wylie's threatening to make a fuss, the liquor was sent back. Dr. Massey and Mr. McCain both repeated Mr. Wylie's statement to them in their speeches at Clover."

In commenting on the Enquirer's article the Columbia State said: "The above statement is confirmed by a special to The State from Yorkville, which gives the same report of Director Wylie's conversation with Messrs. Massey and McCain. The State endeavored Wednesday to obtain statements concerning the matter from Mr. Wylie and Messrs. Massey and McCain. It was found that Mr. Wylie, whose home is in R. Orangeburg, Chester county, is at Cleveland Springs, N. C. A telegram was sent to him there asking him for a statement by telegraph. No reply was received, it being possible that Mr. Wylie was unable to reply Thursday night. Messrs. Massey and McCain were both away from home Wednesday in attendance upon the York county campaign meeting at some point in the county and neither of them could be reached Wednesday." Major Wylie contradicted The State and the Enquirer in what he says below:

"I was on the train on the day mentioned and in company with Dr. Massey and Mr. McCain, but the gentleman quoted by the Enquirer possibly misunderstood me or did not catch my exact words.

"In discussing the dispensary, Dr. Massey said that he wanted to keep it clean and with that idea he had voted for me in the legislature.

"I told him that I thought as long as the whiskey houses kept putting off mean liquor on us, it would be impossible to keep down talk, and that in my opinion county dispensaries would be no better. I went on to say further, that my attention had been called to the quality of some goods we had bought, and I got some samples and carried them to Columbia myself; intending to have them analyzed; but when I got to Columbia, I found that Commissioner Latum had already given samples of these goods to the chemist to be analyzed; that the chemist had reported unfavorably upon them, saying that the goods were of low grade in alcohol percentage and every other way, and that the dispensary force had been instructed by the commissioner to return them.

"Mr. McCain then asked me how much we were going to return. I replied, 'Something like 2,000 gallons in cases and barrels.' The barrel goods were some of the old board's purchases. "I never have said that the other

members of the board were corrupt; nor have I dreamed of saying that I had to make threats to induce the commissioner to return this liquor. On the other hand, as I have just stated, when I suspected the quality of the liquor and started to Columbia to have it analyzed I found that the commissioner had already ascertained that it was unfit for use and ordered it returned.

"I told the gentlemen that ever since I had been on the board I had been in favor of better whiskey, and that the board had put into effect a resolution to buy good, pure whiskeys from bond and blend and bottle them at the dispensary, thus making sure of their purity. "Somebody started a discussion of prohibition. I stated that I had always been a prohibitionist, on principle, and that whenever I should become convinced that we can have prohibition, I will be heartily in favor of it; but if it is simply a question of state dispensaries or county dispensaries, I will take the former every time.

"You cannot too strongly quote me in denying the false statement I am credited with having made regarding the other members of the board. I am at a loss to know how the Enquirer could have received such a distorted and wholly incorrect version of my conversation with Dr. Massey and Mr. McCain."

Who Says It Don't Pay? W. H. Mohr, a prosperous resident of Long Island City, says a New York dispatch, hung a valuable rug out of his window to air a few days ago, and somebody stole it. Mohr put an advertisement in the local papers that the thief was known and he would save much trouble by returning the rug. When Mohr opened his door the morning after the advertisement appeared to take in the milk and the morning paper he found two large bundles awaiting him. One contained his own rug and the other contained another rug. "Yes, it pays to advertise," said Mohr. Yet, some of our merchants claim that advertising does not pay. They ought to consult Mr. Mohr.

Wagon of Sin. Jeremiah Thomas, sixty years old, a well-known whiskey agent of Washington, N. J., and who was until recently proprietor of the only hotel in Oxford Furnace, committed suicide by sending a bullet into his head in the barn connected with Councilman Walter D. Gulick's lumber yards. While conducting the Oxford Hotel a year ago Thomas eloped with Elizabeth, the wife of Bush Teeter, a farmer. They were gone several months, and upon returning to this neighborhood Teeter sued Thomas for damages and also began proceedings for divorce.

Attled to Sleep. In a fit of insanity, Emil Berner, a mechanic of Batavia, Illinois, murdered his brother-in-law, Ernest Franzon, by cutting his throat with a razor, slashed Mrs. Berner's several times, and then cut his own throat and died within a few moments. The tragedy was enacted at the Berner home, Berner had been ill for three weeks, and at times delirious, but no symptoms of violent insanity had been previously noticed.

Koon revived in time to put the fire out and save the house.
