LOOK AT LABEL.

Government Regulations About
Buying Meat in Effect.

DON'T BE IMPOSED ON.

False or Deceptive Names on Labels

No Longer Permitted by Law.

Purity of Product Guaranteed by Government

Inspection Mark.

The new law insuring the freshness and purity of the meat packers' product has now gone into effect and the house-holders may be examining the labels on the packages be assured of what they are buying.

When the disclosures were made some months ago relative to the condition of the packing houses and yards and the careless manner in which the food supply was prepared, the demand for the products fell off in Charleston as at other places and the retail stores have not been able to build up the business to any great extent. Now, however, with the changes which have been made in the system of preparing the goods and the new labels, attesting to the freshness and purity of the products, the stores are looking forward to better trade in the packers' products, but with the loss which many stores experienced with old goods on their hands, the new stocks will not be as large as heretofore in Charleston, until the public pulse has been felt on the trade in the goods in question. The meat label regulations hit the jobbers a hard blow, as may be noted in the extracts from the new law which has just gone into effect:

"Regulation 32.—Upon each can, pot, tin, cask, or other receptacle or covering containing any meat or meat product for interstate or foreign commerce, except packages on which meat inspection stamps appear, there shall be placed under supervision of a department employee, a trade label. This trade label shall contain the words 'U. S. Inspected and Passed, under the Act of Congress of June 30, 1906,' in plain letters and figures of uniform size, the number of the establishment at which the meat or meat food product is last prepared or packed, and labeled, and the true name of the meat or meat food product contained in such package. Only trade names which are not false or deceptive may be used upon the trade label. A copy of each trade label shall be filed with the inspector in charge for his approval. The inspector in charge shall approve or disapprove each trade label, and report his action for approval to the chief of the bureau of animal indus-

try, forwarding which have been approved by the secretary of agriculture shall be used.

"Regulation 33.—No meat or meat food product shall be sold or offered for sale by any person, firm or corporation in interstate or foreign commerce under any false or deceptive name; but established trade names and names which are usual to such products and which are not false and deceptive, and which shall be approved by the secretary of agriculture or permitted. Trade labels which are false or deceptive in any particular shall not be permitted. A meat food product, whether composed of one or more ingredients, shall not be named on a trade label with a name stating or purporting to show that the said meat food product is a substance which is not the principal ingredient contained therein, even though such name be an established trade name.

"Regulation 39.—(1) No meat or meat food product for interstate commerce, or for foreign commerce except as hereinafter provided, shall contain any substance which lessens its wholesomeness, nor any drug, chemical, or dye (unless specifically provided for by a Federal statute), or preservative, other than common salt, sugar, wool, smoke, vinegar, pure spices, and pending further inquiry salt-peter. Inspection and sampling of prepared meats and meat food products by department employees shall be conducted in such manner and at such times as may be necessary to secure a rigid enforcement of this regulation.

"(2) In accordance with the directions of the foreign purchaser or the agent, meats and meat food products prepared for export may contain preservatives in proportions which do not conflict with the laws of the foreign country to which they are to be exported.

"When such meats or meat food products are prepared for export under this regulation they shall be prepared in compartments of the establishment separate and apart from those in which meats and meat food products are prepared according to paragraph (1) of this regulation, and such products shall be kept separate and shall be labeled with special trade labels, approved by the secretary of agriculture, and indicating that such products are for export. Certificates will be issued for meats and meat food products of this character, and, if the products are not exported, under no circumstances shall they be allowed to enter domestic trade.

The regulation regarding false or deceptive names on trade labels is regarded as of first importance in Jobbing circles. It hits the private label a cruel blow, in that hereafter no jobber unless he be a manufacturer of the article will be allowed to use the name of a brand unless he has the words 'packed for' on the label. Heretofore the labels have read as though the brand mentioned covered a product by the jobber himself.

A Fatal Blow.

Resulting from a quarrel as to obeying orders given by Charles Layton, foreman of a dairy at Raleigh, N. C. Andrew Mooneyham, Layton struck Mooneyham over the head with a shovel, crushing the skull and killing him. Mooneyham was advancing on Layton with a stick at the time. Mooneyham's wife came up and saw her husband lying on the ground. She attacked Layton, who struck her with his fist and knocked her down. She is in a serious condition. Layton was arrested.
