NEW YORK STATE FOR JUDGE PARKER

HILL DOMINATED THE CONVENTION YESTERDAY.

Reports Yesterday Afternoon Indicated Delegates Would be Instructed For Parker.

Columbia, April 18.—The New York Democratic convention met at two o'clock today and the preliminary caucuses were held. David B. Hill, promoter of the Parker campaign in New York, dominated the convention.

The delegates will be elected tonight and all reports from the convention indicate that in all probability the delegates will be instructed for Judge Parker.

This is now accepted as a fact by the leaders in the convention.

At the session of the convention this morning the unit rule was decided upon, which means that New York's vote in the convention will be cast as a unit for Judge Parker.

A FARMERS' OIL MILL ASSURED FOR NEWBERRY

AN ORGANIZATION EFFECTED ON SATURDAY.

Fourteen Thousand Dollars Subscribed to Capital Stock—Directors—Constitution

The establishment of the proposed Farmers' Oil Mill in Newberry is now assured. Fourteen thousand dollars has been subscribed to the capital stock of the enterprise and at a meeting of the stockholders, held on Saturday, an organization was effected by the adoption of a constitution and the election of a board of directors, who will meet on Wednesday to elect officers.

The capital stock of the mill was placed at not less than \$14,000, nor more than \$50,000, the shares to be of the value of \$10 each, and the directors were instructed to take the proper steps to procure a charter and to continue the canvass for subscribers until \$30,000 has been subscribed. The directors were also empowered and instructed to proceed to secure a site and to erect such a mill as the capital stock will warrant.

The directors elected are as follows: H. H. Folk, T. M. Neel, B. F. Cannon, B. C. Matthews, J. H. Wicker, I. H. Boulware, H. H. Evans, W. K.

Sligh, Geo. C. Glasgow, David Pitts, W. C. Sligh.

Meeting of Stockholders.

The meeting of the stockholders on Saturday morning was held in the court house. The meeting was well attended and much enthusiasm and a great deal of interest were manifested. Mr. I. H. Boulware presided and Mr. S. P. Crowell was secretary.

Reports were received from several of the townships which had been canvassed for subscriptions, showing that about \$14,000 had been subscribed. Many of the townships were not heard from.

Under a resolution offered by Prof. W. K. Sligh and unanimously adopted, it was decided to proceed at once to organize a Cotton Seed Oil company by adopting a constitution and electing a board of directors.

Prof. W. K. Sligh, for the committee to prepare a constitution, submitted a constitution, which was considered and adopted by items, as follows:

The Constitution.

Article I. Name.—The name of this company shall be "The Farmers' Oil Mill," and its principal place of business shall be at Newberry, S. C.

Article II. Object.—The business of the company shall be to buy and grind cotton seed, sell the resulting products, gin cotton, and manufacture and sell fertilizers.

Article III. Capital Stock.—The capital stock of the company shall be not less than twelve thousand dollars

and not more than fifty thousand dollars. The stock shall be divided into shares of the par value of ten dollars each.

Article IV. Officers.—The management of the company shall be vested in eleven directors, who shall be elected by the stockholders at their regular annual meetings to serve for a term of one year. The directors shall elect a president, a secretary, a treasurer, and a general manager, to serve for a term of one year, and fix the amount of compensation which each shall receive. The directors shall have a right to combine two or more offices in one. The directors shall adopt a set of by-laws, which shall fully set forth the duties and powers of each officer and such general rules for the conduct of the company's business as they may deem proper, provided no rule conflicts with this constitution. No one who is not a stockholder shall be a director or other officer of this company.

Article V. Powers Not Granted Directors.—The board of directors shall not have the power to increase the capital stock of the company, nor shall they contract debts in excess of the assets of the company without first obtaining the consent of the stockholders.

Article VI. Meetings.—The stockholders shall hold their regular annual meeting on the third Wednesday in May of each year. Other meetings may be called by the president
