

Section 4. Persons non-resident of the city may become members by sending in their application in the prescribed way and by paying a membership fee of five dollars (\$5.00).

Section 5. A rejected applicant may reapply for membership after a lapse of three months, if he so desires.

ARTICLE III
Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be composed of active members only and shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Board of nine Governors, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of one year, at the regular annual meeting, the 3rd Thursday in March of each year.

All officers shall be elected by a majority vote.

If from any cause there be a failure to elect, the former officers shall hold over their respective offices until their successors shall have been chosen.

Section 2. The President shall be chairman of the Board of Governors and the Vice-Presidents shall be members thereof.

Section 3. A majority of the Board of Governors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE IV.

Duty Of President

Section 1. The President shall preside at all business meetings of the organization and at all meetings of the Board of Governors. He shall sign all drafts upon the Treasurer, which the organization or Board of Governors may order to be paid, and shall decide all points of order, subject to appeal to the members of the organization who may be present. He shall appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in these by-laws. In the absence of the President from any of his duties, one of the Vice-Presidents shall assume these duties.

ARTICLE V

Duty Of Secretary

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a correct record of all proceedings of this organization and of the Board of Governors. He shall furnish any Committee with a copy of the resolutions under which it was appointed and shall give notice of all meetings of the organization or Board.

He shall notify applicants for membership of their election or rejection, and, in case of rejection, shall return the fees. He shall have his books and records ready for inspection at any time by the Board of Governors conduct all correspondence and perform such duties as usually appertain to his office. For such service he shall receive in compensation such a sum as may be fixed by the Board.

ARTICLE VI

Duty Of Treasurer

Section 1. The Treasurer shall collect and take charge of funds of the organization, disburse them only by written order of the President, countersigned by Secretary and shall give such bond as the Board may deem necessary.

ARTICLE VII

Duty of Board of Governors

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Governors to exercise a general supervision over the affairs of the organization. It shall appoint annually, from regular members of the organization, twelve standing committees of not less than five members each, as follows:

- Manufactures.
- Commerce.
- Transportation.
- Public Improvements.
- Conventions.
- Public Entertainment.
- Advertising.
- Statistics and Information.
- Legislation.
- Rules.
- Education.
- Finance.

Section 2. The Board shall make such rules and regulations as it may deem best for the proper working of the organization, the conduct of its members and the care of its property, etc.

Section 3. The Board shall fix the monthly dues, levy assessments for current expenses, fix such fines for infractions of rules as may be found necessary, and transact all business not in violation of the charter under which this organization exists, or in conflict with these by-laws.

Section 4. Upon the request of a standing committee of ten members, the President or the Board of Governors shall call an extra meeting of the organization and audit and approve all claims against the organization for payment. Fifteen members, regularly

convened, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

GENERAL RULES.

Rule 1. The annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce shall be held on the third Thursday of March of each year. Extra meetings may be called by the President or Board as per Article 7, Section 4 of the by-laws.

Rule 2. Vacancies by death or resignation shall be filled by the Board of Governors for the unexpired terms.

Rule 3. Any member who is in arrears for dues or fines for three months and refuses or fails to pay the same, thereby forfeits his membership.

Rule 4. Any member wishing to withdraw from this organization shall be at liberty to do so by giving notice in writing to the President, and, if such member is clear on the books, he shall be entitled to a certificate showing that he was a member in good standing at date of withdrawal; Provided he entirely forfeits his interest in stock to the organization. Any former member holding a withdrawal certificate may become entitled to the privileges of the organization upon such conditions as may be fixed by the Board of Governors.

Rule 5. Any motion adding to, or altering or repealing any general rule shall be made in writing and shall lie over one month; and, if two thirds of the members then present approve of such alteration, addition or repeal, it shall be adopted as part of these rules.

Rule 6. It is supposed that members will at all times observe gentlemanly conduct and decorum. Should any difference arise among members, or acts of disorder occur in the rooms, or any member be guilty, there or elsewhere, of conduct unbecoming a member: the same, being proved to the satisfaction of the Board, the Board may fine or suspend such member; expulsion shall be by the Chamber of Commerce.

Rule 7. Members shall pay for all breakages or damages to the property of the Chamber of Commerce, caused by its improper use by such members or their guests.

Rule 8. All complaints, grievances or suggestions for the good of the Chamber of Commerce, shall be made in writing to the President.

Rule 9. All dues are payable monthly in advance. Any member failing to pay dues or fines by the fifteenth (15th) of the month in which same are due, shall be notified by the Treasurer. If such payment is not made by the last day of the month, the delinquent shall be debarred the privileges of the Chamber of Commerce.

Rule 10. Any member may introduce into the Chamber of Commerce any visiting non-resident of the city, provided the name of the person so introduced, the date of the introduction and the name of the member making the introduction, be inscribed in the visitor's register, and any visitor so introduced shall be given a card in regular form, which will entitle him to the courtesies of the organization for ten days. Resident non-members shall not be introduced into the rooms of the organization.

Rule 11. The rooms of the organization shall be kept open every day, except Sunday, from 9 o'clock a. m. until midnight.

Rule 12. Any member of the Board of Governors failing to attend a meeting of same, without satisfactory excuse, shall pay a fine of twenty-five cents.

Rule 13. There shall be posted in the business office of the organization a roster of the membership with the list of officials and the various committees. The same shall at all times be kept up-to-date.

Rule 14. The monthly dues, payable in advance, shall be one dollar for resident members and 50 cents for non-resident, until changed by the Board.

Rule 15. No intoxicating liquors, no card playing, no gambling and no betting shall be allowed in the rooms of the organization.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Manufactures.

The Committee on Manufactures shall have special charge of all matters pertaining to the industrial interests of Newberry and vicinity, which are introduced into this Association; it shall endeavor to set before the Association, and the public through the proper mediums the advantages of the city of Newberry as a manufacturing center; learn about manufacturers who are looking for sites, and endeavor to induce them to establish here.

Commerce.

It shall be the duty of this Committee to use every endeavor to enlarge Newberry's trade territory, and to assist in the establishment of de-

tail business houses in Newberry.

Transportation.

The Committee on Transportation shall obtain useful information relating to railroads and steamboats and keep itself advised with reference to the transportation interests of the City, and make special reports thereon whenever it may be considered necessary. It shall perform like duties with reference to the telephone and telegraph interest of the City.

Public Improvements.

This Committee's particular duty shall be to look after paving the streets, such other matters as would improve and beautify the City and to attend to improvement of country roads.

Conventions.

The duties of this Committee shall be to keep posted in regard to conventions, re-unions, etc., and to use all endeavors to have such conventions, etc., select Newberry as the place for future assemblage.

Public Entertainment.

This Committee is charged with special attention to hospitality within the City of Newberry. Its duties shall be to extend the courtesies of the Association, of the city, of its people so far as it can be done, to all strangers visiting the City, and especially to those who come for the purpose of selecting sites or making investments. It shall have supervision of the entertainments given by the Chamber of Commerce.

Advertising.

This Committee shall have special charge of the diffusion of intelligence to the general public on all matters relating to the manufacturing, real estate, commercial and financial interests of the City of Newberry.

Statistics and Information.

This Committee shall collect facts and information pertinent to the objects of the organization. It shall confer with the President as to the best method of utilizing such intelligence with reference to all matters to be referred to in his annual report, and to perform such other duties as may be required.

Legislation.

The committee on Legislation shall consider such matters of Legislation as may be of interest or importance to Newberry and vicinity. It shall act with any committee of the City Council, that may be appointed if so desired by committee, with regard to legislation affecting interest of the City of Newberry.

Rules.

This Committee shall propose from time to time such changes in the by-laws or order of business as they may deem expedient or necessary.

Education.

The duty of this Committee shall be to further the educational interests of Newberry in any way possible, to co-operate with our various institutions in setting forth our superior educational advantages and induce people to educate at Newberry.

Finance.

The name of this Committee suggests its duties. Any matter concerning finance may be referred to it, from time to time, by the Board.

PARLIAMENTARY RULES.

1. Any member desiring to speak upon any subject shall rise and address the Chair and shall confine himself strictly to the subject under discussion. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice upon the same subject without permission of the Chair.

2. All motions shall be made in writing, if required by the Chair or two members, and no debate shall be permitted except upon a motion made and seconded and stated from the Chair; but a member shall not be prevented from prefaceing any motion he may be about to make.

3. The Chair shall decide all questions of order, and may call any transgressing member to order so often as he may infringe upon the rules of the organization; but any member so called to order may explain himself and may appeal to the organization, if seconded, and in such an appeal, a majority of the members present shall decide.

4. No business before the organization shall be interrupted, except by motion for the previous question, postponement or adjournment, and such motion shall preclude amendment or discussion of the original subject until such motion shall be disposed of; but the previous question shall not be moved except by a majority of the members present.

5. A member may call for a division on a question when the sense will admit of it.

6. All parliamentary questions not herein settled shall be settled ac-

corded to parliamentary usage.

TILLMAN MAY BE PRESIDENT.

Greatest Talked Of Man In The United States Today.

Washington, March 7.—A man who lives in Barnwell county and who has been spending the last week in New York, arrived in Washington today, and said that during the time he was in New York there was little else talked about in hotel lobbies and other public places but Tillman. "I never saw anything like it in my life," he said, "no matter where I went it seemed that Tillman was the only thing and only man talked about. New York is a large city, and there are many men of prominence there, but during the time I spent in that place I am sure I heard more of Tillman than anything else—so much in fact, that sometimes I thought I must be in some South Carolina town.

"His recent actions in the senate have set the public eye on him as nothing else could have done, and I believe he is more talked about today than any other man of the United States—the present occupant of the White House not excepted.

"In one of the largest hotels of New York I came up to a group of men gathered from all sections of the United States, and the consensus of opinion seemed to be that if Tillman hailed from any other section than the south there would be the strongest possibility of his receiving the next democratic nomination for president. There were none in the crowd who disputed that he had shown himself to be one of the brainiest men in the senate and that he now occupies a high place in the public eye. It was agreed also by the crowd in the lobby that if Tillman could remove his citizenship to New York, or perhaps some western state, he would stand as good a chance as any other democrat to be the next occupant of the White House."
