The funeral services will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the St. James Methodist church. The interment will be at Westview cemetery. Members of Camp Stonewall Jackson, U. C. V., are urged to pay a last tribute to their gallant comrade by attendance.—Atlanta Journal, 11th.

SURRENDERED BY BONDSMAN.

Ike Reed, Who Has Been For Some Time Under Charge of Murder, Gives New Bond.

Ike Reed, a negro who lives near Whitmire, was placed in jail Wednesday by Magistrate Z. B. Wright, upon the order of Mr. W. A. Andrews. Reed has been under indictment for some time for the crime of murder, he being charged as an accessory along with Frank Rice, also colored, for the killing of another negro near Whitmire about three years ago. Rice has never been apprehended, and for that reason the case against Reed has been continued from time to time. The case has been put on the contingent docket by the order of the court, and it may not be heard for some time yet.

Soon after he was arrested Reed was granted bail in the sum of seven hundred dollars and Mr. W. A. Andrews went his bond. A short time since Reed left Mr. Andrews' employ and that gentleman not desiring to remain the surety for a negro who did not live on his place, ordered Magistrate Wright to convey him to jail.

However, Reed had been in jail but a few hours when he was ordered to be released by Clerk of Court Goggans, the negro having furnished another bondsman in the person of Mr. J. C. Tidmarsh.

Reed has employed an attorney and will make an effort at the next term of court to have the case against him tried or dismissed.

Rain has fallen almost continuously for the past number of days. It has not been hard enough to wash or to pack the dirt, but the fall has been gentle and steady, and the mud has continued to get deeper. It is impossible for teams or pedestrians to move about town with any degree of comfort at all. In fact, many places are almost impassable.

One of Newberry's greatest needs now is a sufficient expenditure for permanent street improvement to put the streets in good condition. Of course, it is impossible to do much work at this particular time, in view of the bad weather, but there ought to be some work done, and work of a permanent nature, as soon as it is practicable. The great trouble is, when the weather is good and the streets and sidewalks are in good condition, people are apt to lose sight of the fact that then is the time for the permanent work to be done.

JEFFERSON DAVIS.

Daughters of Confederacy Urge That His Life Be Studied in the Schools.

Whereas, 1908 will be the centennial year of the birth of Jefferson Davis, who commanded the First Mississippi regiment when the regiment was brilliantly successful at Monterey, and carried the day for the United States army at Bena Vista, who served the United States with unexampled efficiency as secretary of war under President Pierce, who represented the sovereign state of Mississippi most ably and patriotically in the United States senate and who was the one and only president of the Southern Confederacy, therefore, be it

Resolved, First, That the general convention, United Daughters of the Confederacy, in session at Norfolk, Va., November, 1907, hereby most earnestly requests all presidents of universities and colleges, superintendents of public education and principals of schools to introduce the supplementary study of the life of Jefferson Davis into the respective schools under their charge during the year 1908. We ask for the use of the following named works in whole or in part, as necessary to a correct understanding of his character and career, viz: "The Rise and Fall of the Confederate Government," by Jefferson Davis, "Mrs. Davis' Memoirs," "Prison Life of Jefferson Davis," by Dr. J. J. Craven, and the "Memorial Volume of Jefferson Davis," by Dr. J. William Jones.

Second: That all ministers of religion are especially invited to the study of the religious life of Jefferson Davis, that his pious example may appear for the edification of those under their charge and influence.

Third: That this body does agree to present a gavel made of Beauvoir wood with silver name plate, to each literary club or society which shall be organized during the year of 1908, provided that each club or society shall be named for Jefferson Davis, any member of his family either of his homes, Briarfield or Beauvoir.
