

REPUBLICANS DECLARE THE NEGROES UNFIT

CAPERS LAUNCHES "ALL WHITE" REPUBLICAN PARTY.

Blalock State Chairman—Committee-men Named From Each Congressional District.

Columbia, Oct. 27.—A new Republican party dawned in South Carolina today. Eliminating the negro entirely and asking nothing of the federal office-holders, none of whom was present at the convention. More than 100 of those who believe in the Republican doctrines met at noon in the Columbia theatre, in this city, and inaugurated a branch of the national organization for this State, which the leaders think will be fruitful of much good. In 1912, according to resolution, Congressional candidates will be in the field.

In a keynote speech before the convention John G. Capers outlined the hopes of the party in this State, its position with regard to the negro, who, he declared, is "not made nor fit for political equalization with you and me," and summing up the object of the convention and reorganization of the party, as "the beginning of the emancipation of political thought and action in South Carolina, the like of which has not been known in forty years in this State," he said that the newly organized Republican party is not to be composed of office-holders. "We have burned everything behind us," declared Capt. Capers, after the convention, "and we are starting out afresh without the office-holders. Out of 113 delegates here today, you note that there is not one office-holder in the crowd."

South Carolina "Insurgency."

The meeting today marks somewhat of an "insurgency" among the Republicans in South Carolina. The meeting does not recognize the convention held last month at which were present only a few white men, the vast majority being negroes. The meeting, in the opinion of Capt. Capers, that was held here today, formally organized a Republican party in this State regardless of any other conventions held.

Several things were made quite clear at today's session:

1. The negro vote is not wanted by the new Republicans.
2. The appeal will be made to business men and farmers, and not to office holders and office seekers.
3. The negro has been a burden around the Southern white man's neck as to Republican efforts in the South.

Organization Effected.

L. W. C. Blalock, of Goldville, Laurens county, is chairman of the Republican State executive committee, having been nominated at the convention today. I. H. Norris, of York county, is a vice chairman; D. H. Wallace, of Union, is secretary-treasurer. Capt. Capers presided over the convention today.

In addition to the above named officers of the committee, the following were named on the Republican State executive committee:

- At Large—Z. A. Robertson, of Cherokee; John Canty, of Kershaw.

Charleston Not Represented.

Charleston was not represented. That county was among the six counties not having delegates here, and Berkeley was another of the lower counties that were marked absent. There was a bunch of rumors as to Charleston. It was said that, inasmuch as the Taft administration had not put an official "O. K." on today's meeting, Postmaster Harris, generally recognized to be the leader of the Charleston Republicans, and others from Charleston, had stayed away on this account. It was admitted by Capt. Capers that the convention was not called by order of the administration or anyone else.

There were present at the Columbia theatre 113 delegates, out of a representation of 134 members. This was a gratifying number to those who have worked to make the reorganization a success.

The important legislation and other things for which the South Carolina Republicans stand are set out in the following set of resolutions adopted today:

Republican party has been called or held in this State during the year 1910, and no legal convention had been called or held up to October 5, 1910, only three days more than a month before the general election of November 8, following; and whereas, the Republican organization through a State central committee or a State executive committee which may have existed has now ceased to exist and is therefore without power to perform its functions, and whereas, the South Carolina member of the Republican national committee, in view of these conditions has issued a call for a State convention under the mass meeting plan, county by county, such plan being recognized by the Republican national committee where no party organization exists in a newly created State of the Union, and in cases where the once existing party organization has ceased and become defunct, and whereas, acting under that call delegates have been chosen from the counties of the State and are here assembled in State convention in the opera house in the city of Columbia, S. C., this 27th day of October, 1910. Therefore your committee recommends the adoption and ratification of the call issued by the South Carolina member of the Republican national committee and the organization of the Republican party, this day perfected under that call.

"Your committee further recommends that there shall be a State executive committee composed of a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary-treasurer, two members at large and twenty-one additional members of the executive committee, three from each of the seven Congressional districts in the State, to be elected by this convention. The officers of said executive committee as well as the additional members thereof to be entitled to vote upon all questions under consideration by the committee; that said executive committee be empowered and directed to frame such rules, plans and regulations as may be necessary to further perfect the organization of the Republican party in this State as has this day been established, including the county and the Congressional district organizations including also the right hereby vested in said executive committee to fill all vacancies existing, for any cause, upon said executive committee.

"Your committee directs attention to, and warmly endorses, what has been accomplished in national legislation during the administration of President Taft, who has so steadfastly lead kindly light through all of the differences of opinion in our own party as to the application of schedules in a tariff law, the fundamental principles of which, however, all Republicans firmly adhere to.

"In this, as in the management of all of our national affairs, President Taft has demonstrated the greatest patriotism and wisdom, all of which has been a source of confidence and pride to the people of his party in all sections of the country.

Laws Favored.

"Your committee further submits with its unanimous approval the following resolutions:

- "1. Resolved, That we favor a more rigid immigration law, so framed as to exclude from our country the indigent pauper and vicious people of other countries.
- "2. We heartily approve the laws recently enacted by our State legislature fixing the age limit for the employment of children in the manufacturing of our country and favor a gradual increase of such age limit until two years have been added to the age now fixed by law. We congratulate the officers and directors of our manufacturing interests upon their cheerful and cordial support of the spirit and letter of this law.
- "3. We are in favor of a standard eight-hour a day law for the laboring men and women of our country.
- "4. We are in favor of such a continued adjustment of the tariff as will preserve to the laboring people of our country such protection as will enable them to enjoy a just proportion of our country's prosperity in accordance with the established standard of living of the American workman.

For 1912 Nominations.

"No person shall be eligible to be a member of a club, a delegate to State, county, district or judicial conventions except he is a registered voter in the precinct in which he lives."

"That the delegates return to their homes and organize the party in the counties and Congressional districts based on today's organization, looking to active efforts toward nomination in 1912 of seven Congressional candidates from each of seven Congressional districts in the State."

The platform adopted was brief but comprehensive, being as follows:

Mr. Chairman: Your committee on platform respectfully submits the following report:

The Republican party of South Carolina, in convention assembled, in the opera house of the city of Columbia, this 27th day of October, 1910, adopted the following resolutions:

For Mayor.

J. J. Langford is hereby nominated for mayor, subject to the primary election.

P. F. Baxter is hereby nominated for mayor, subject to the primary election.

Alderman Ward 1.

Jno. W. Earhardt is hereby nominated as alderman for Ward 1, subject to the primary election.

Voters.

Alderman Ward 2.

R. B. Lominack is hereby announced for reelection as alderman for Ward 2, subject to the primary election.

John B. Mayes is nominated for alderman from Ward 2, subject to the rules of the Democratic primary.

Alderman Ward 3.

Clarence T. Summer is hereby announced as a candidate for alderman for Ward 3, and will abide the rules of the Democratic primary.

The friends of Mr. J. B. Walton place him in nomination for alderman for Ward 3, and pledge him to abide the results of the Democratic primary.

Alderman Ward 4.

I hereby announce myself a candidate for alderman from Ward 4, subject to the rules of the Democratic primary.

Ollie O. Smith.

E. L. Rodelsperger is hereby nominated for re-election as alderman for Ward 4, subject to the primary election.

Alderman Ward 5.

O. S. Gore is hereby nominated as alderman for Ward 5, subject to the primary election.

Trustee Ward 3.

The friends of Hon. Otto Klettner nominate him for re-election for school trustee from Ward 3, subject to the rules of the Democratic primary.
