A NEWBERRY WOMAN.

Negro Arrested Here Wanted in Connection With Murder Charge at Pine Bluff, Ark.

In a recent issue of The Herald and News it was stated that Sheriff Buford had arrested a negro woman, Mary Rutherford, wanted in Arkansas for murder, on advices received from Sheriff Brewster, of Jefferson county. It seems that recently there was a killing at Pine Bluff, in which an arrest has been made, and Mary was arrested on a warrant charging her with being an accessory, and a fugitive from justice. Mary was found at the house of her sister, Martha McCracken. It seems that she is a Newberry woman who has been living in Arkansas recently. She has tuberculosis and she was brought here in November by a negro physician, Dr. B. F. Fulton. When her presence was demanded in Arkansas, the sheriff and the solicitor deputized Fulton to come to come to Newberry for the woman. He was still here yesterday awaiting the proper papers.

The arrests which have been made in the case in which Mary is charged, according to a dispatch from Pine Bluff, are those of J. W. Etheridge, a merchant of Fall Back, Miss., and two negroes held as witnesses. It appears that one Albert McVey was assassinat-

ed, and it is for this assassination that the arrests have been made. The negro doctor who is here says that Mary is wanted merely as a witness, but Sheriff Buford says that his advices from Arkansas are to the effect that she is wanted as an accessory.
