The firm is composed of Otwey Salter and his sister, Miss T. E. Salter, who are both natives of Newberry, and who came from a family of photographers...

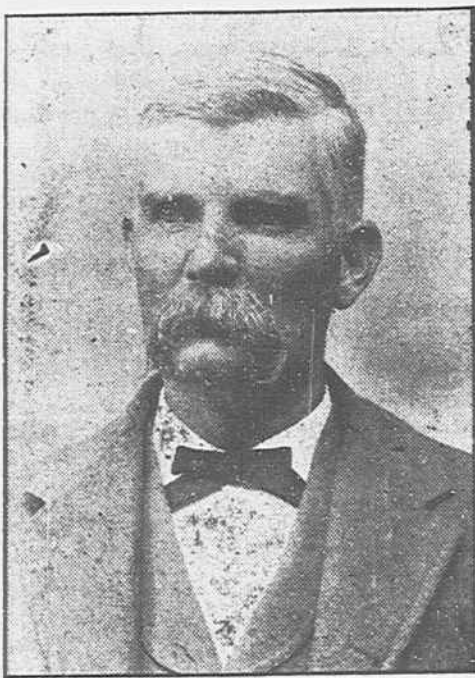

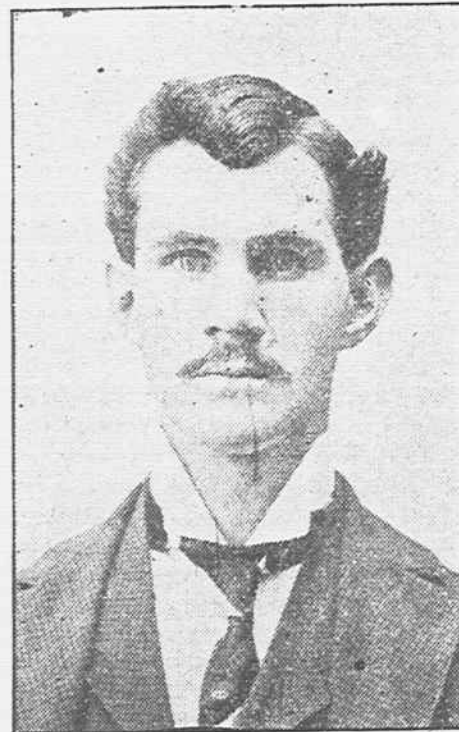
JOHN C. GOGGANS. Clerk of the Court.

No public official can produce a better record than is contained in continuous re-election term after term, and this has been the experience of John C. Goggans, clerk of the court of Newberry county. This repeated re-election is the people's endorsement of the services maintained and is a recognition of efficiency and fidelity in the discharge of the duties of the position.

A native of Newberry county, having been born in what is known as New Chapel section in 1853, the subject of this sketch grew up on his father's farm, receiving such educational training as he could at the old field school near his home and at Mount Zion, and New Chapel, afterwards attending a preparatory school

in the McIlhenn section, conducted by the late Thomas Duckett, and graduating in 1876 from Furman University at Greenville, S. C. Returning to his home he engaged in farming up to 1890, when he moved to Newberry to educate his children, engaging in mercantile lines until 1900, when he was elected clerk of the court, relinquishing the office of clerk and treasurer of the city of Newberry to accept that position.

His incumbency of the office of clerk of the court, to which he was first elected in 1900, as has been stated, has been successful, for at every succeeding election since that time he has received the endorsement of his fellow citizens in a re-election. He is one of Newberry county's most popular men, being among the representative citizens of the community and enjoying fully the good will and confidence of the people of Newberry county...



EUGENE S. WERTS. County Auditor.

The duties of County Auditor safeguard the interests of the community as a whole and the taxpayer as an individual by keeping a complete record of all claims for and against the county, making up the tax books and checking up the county finances. So that the position is important and is surrounded with great responsibility, to be assumed only by men of established integrity, ability and reliability.

Mr. Werts is a native of Newberry county, having been born near Silverstreet on March 28, 1876. In his earlier life he attended the rural school in his neighborhood, afterwards entering Newberry college and following this up with a business course at Asheville, N. C. Returning to his home he taught school two years in Lexington county and four years in Newberry county. Recognizing his superior qualifications his fellow citizens elected him superintendent of education for Newberry county in 1900, which position he held four years. In 1905 he was elected city clerk and treasurer of Newberry. With the passing years his popularity grew apace and his name was frequently mentioned for county auditor by his friends and through their efforts, combined with personal qualifications, which justified his preference, he was elected to the position in 1908.

NOTICE TO DEMOCRATIC CLUBS.

In accordance with the constitution of the Democratic party of South Carolina, the Democratic clubs of the County of Newberry are hereby called to meet at their respective places of meeting on Saturday, April 27, 1912, for the purpose of reorganization. At this meeting, in addition to the election of officers for the club, there should be elected one member from each club to serve as a member of the County Executive Committee for two years, and also delegates to the County Convention, which will convene at Newberry Court House on Monday, May 6, 1912. Each club is entitled to one delegate for every twenty-five members, and one delegate for a majority fraction thereof.

Any proposed new club shall meet at the same time, for the same purpose and organization as the old club. Secretaries will forward names of delegates to the County Convention to the Secretary at their earliest convenience.

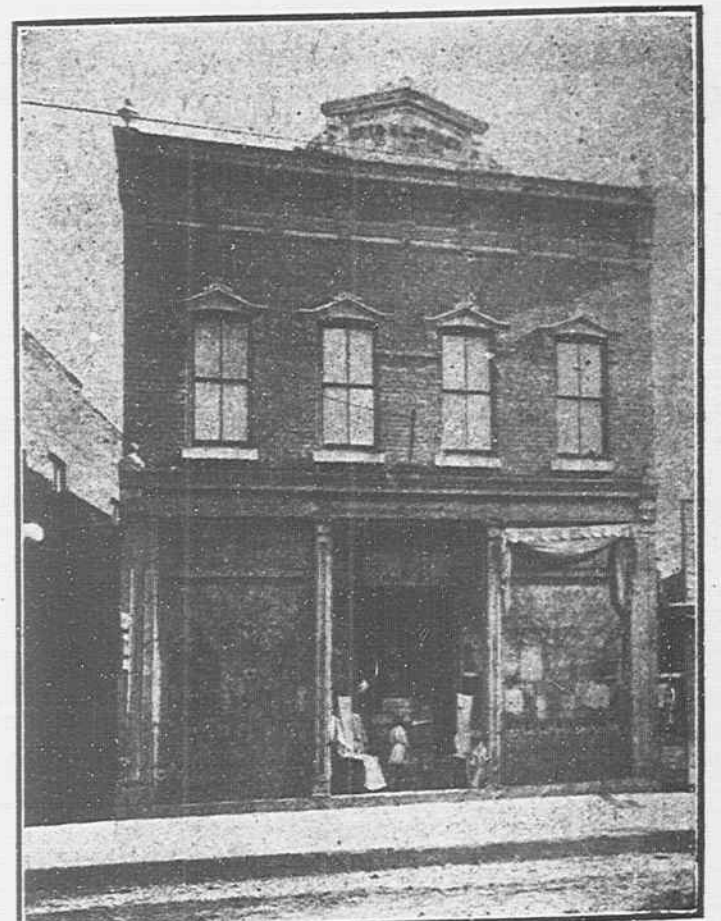

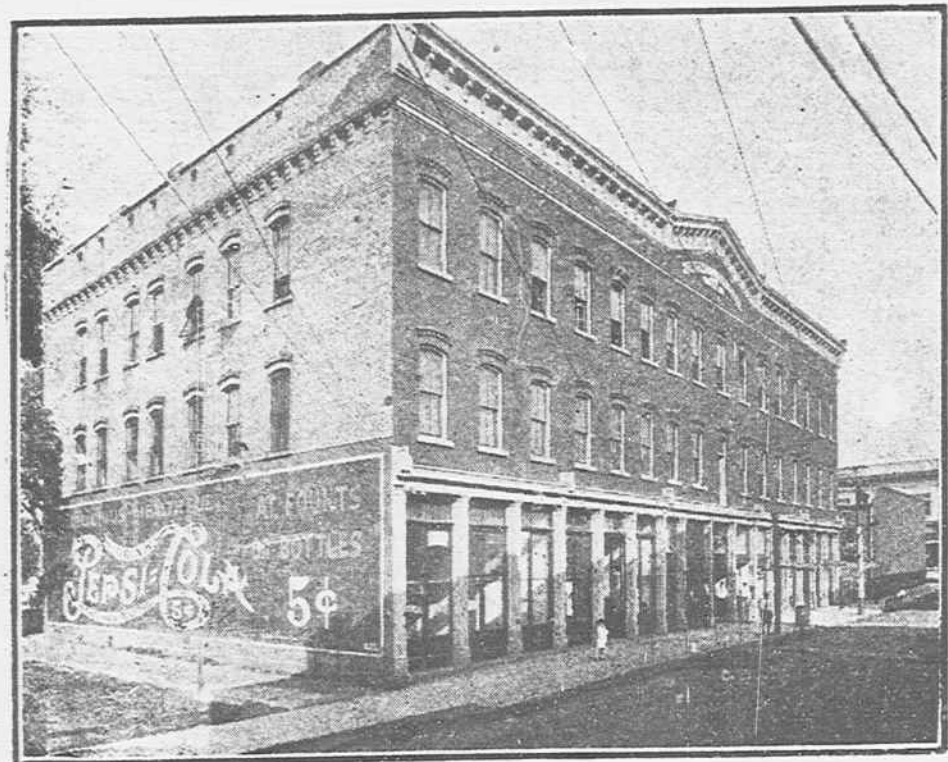
