Help From Vanderbilt.

"It further recognizes that the affiliation of this instituton wth Vanderbilt university will greatly enhance the value of both institutions. The board has therefore watched with sympathetic interest the progress of the movement.

"The general education board has been interested in the promotion of practical farming in the Southern States and in the development of an efficient system of rural schools. The George Peabody college for teachers propose to train leaders for rural schools; not for the traditional rural school, but for the new school which shall meet the needs of an agricultural population.

"After consultation with the president and trustees of the college the general education board now makes a contribution of \$250,000 toward the endowment of the George Peabody College for Teachers and for the specific purpose of supporting the Seaman A. Knapp School of Country Life. For ten years the late Dr. Knapp was the recognized leader of the new agricultural life of the South. It is fitting that his name be associated with the George Peabody College for Teachers, his great work perpetuated through this institution and his name beside that of George Peabody.
