How beautiful the split log drag would work and how nice the roads would be if it were put in use now after the shower of Sunday night. Even some of these streets right here in town could be greatly helped by the split log drag.

If Mayor Wright would just commence building some permanent streets you would see business begin to get on a boom. The progress of almost any town dates from the time it began the work of permanent streets in earnest. No money, did you say? Well, put the town in debt and let those who will come after us and who will enjoy the good streets help to bear the burden. If any one generation undertook to do all the permanent improving there would be none accomplished.

We wonder sometimes if the people of Newberry are satisfied with the condition in which the cemetery is kept, and then we conclude they must be or conditions would be improved, because we can not believe that those who are interested are not able to make the city more beautiful. A small amount from each one interested would make some respectable drive ways through the grounds. These drive ways are as bad as some of our roads and streets. If the trustees would only ask those who have lots we feel sure there would be a sufficient amount voluntarily given to make the roads decent and also to put up a neat fence around the grounds.

The mix-up between the governor and the war department at Washington is unfortunate. The official correspondence is published in full in this issue of The Herald and News. It seems to us that in this matter Governor Blease is correct. We do not know a great deal about military rules, but even to the layman it would seem that it was but proper courtesy due at least to the commander-in-chief of the militia of this State that he should be consulted before it was decided to arrange a military encampment of the troops of this State together with the military forces of the other States within the State. In all of the letters and telegrams of the governor, he has said that the governor would be glad to have the encampment within South Carolina.

If any of the east side citizens will pass along by Willowbrook park now we feel sure that they will regret that they did not cooperate with The Idler a few years ago when it was trying to induce the people of Newberry to get together and build a park on the east side. It is not too late yet. All it needs is some public spirited citizen, himself to put up a little money and take the lead and the thing is done. A park from the railroad bridge all the way up the north fork of Scott's creek to Glenn street with rustic bridges and other things for the amusement of the children and the grown ups. It could be done and it would make an ideal park. Few towns have such a fine natural advantage for the building of a park and most of the land could be secured at a nominal price. A boulevard on either side of the park on the outer edge would enhance the value of adjoining property that it would pay all those who own property along the side to donate the land for the park. Somebody get busy quick.

A call has been issued according to the rules of the Democratic party for all of the clubs to meet on Saturday, April 25, for the purpose of reorganizing and electing delegates to the county convention. All members of the various clubs should meet promptly at the time designated and take part in this organization and election of delegates. If they do not attend the club meetings and the results are not what they would like they will have to blame themselves to blame. 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GOVERNOR BLEASE ON MILITIA ENCAMPMENT

at what point, I have no suggestion to make. If this is satisfactory to you, all well and good; if it is not, the encampment will have to be held somewhere else.

As to the matter of volunteers from this State, in case of war with Mexico, I have already received letters, telegrams, and personal requests from individuals, from companies, and from one entire regiment, volunteering their services, and South Carolina will, not only in case of war with Mexico, but in case of war with any other nation on earth, furnish to the United States more than her pro rata share of as true, as brave, and as gallant men as ever marched on a field of battle; and, if such call is made while I am governor of South Carolina, the commander-in-chief of her militia will be found in the front ranks, leading her men, and not sitting back surrounded with the luxuries of life throughout the day, and a feather bed to sleep in at night. As far as that is concerned, I believe South Carolina can whip Mexico by herself.

Dear Sir: Your letter of April 4th, 1914, has been received.

I regret very much that your inspecting officer, and some others connected with him, seem, through prejudice, to want to continue to nag at

some of our companies here. Of course I can not make you pay them their pro rata share of the appropriation, but I most assuredly will not muster any of them out of the service. I hope that this is plain enough.

I see from newspaper reports that certain maneuvers have been agreed upon and that certain orders have been issued for the same, within the borders of this State. I do not know that this is true. However, it seems a little strange to me that I, as governor of the State and commander-in-chief of its militia, should not be consulted in regard to these maneuvers, or the place at which they are to be held; as to my State troops attending, or as to other State troops being sent into my State, but, on the contrary, all of his is being arranged, or seems to be, without any advice to, or consultation with me as commander-in-chief. If this is your manner of running your department in other States, probably with them it is all right, but I wish to say to you that I deem it a courtesy due to me as governor of my State that I shall at least be consulted in reference to this matter, and before the State troops of South Carolina attend any such maneuvers, I assure you that I will be consulted, or there will be no troops in this State.
