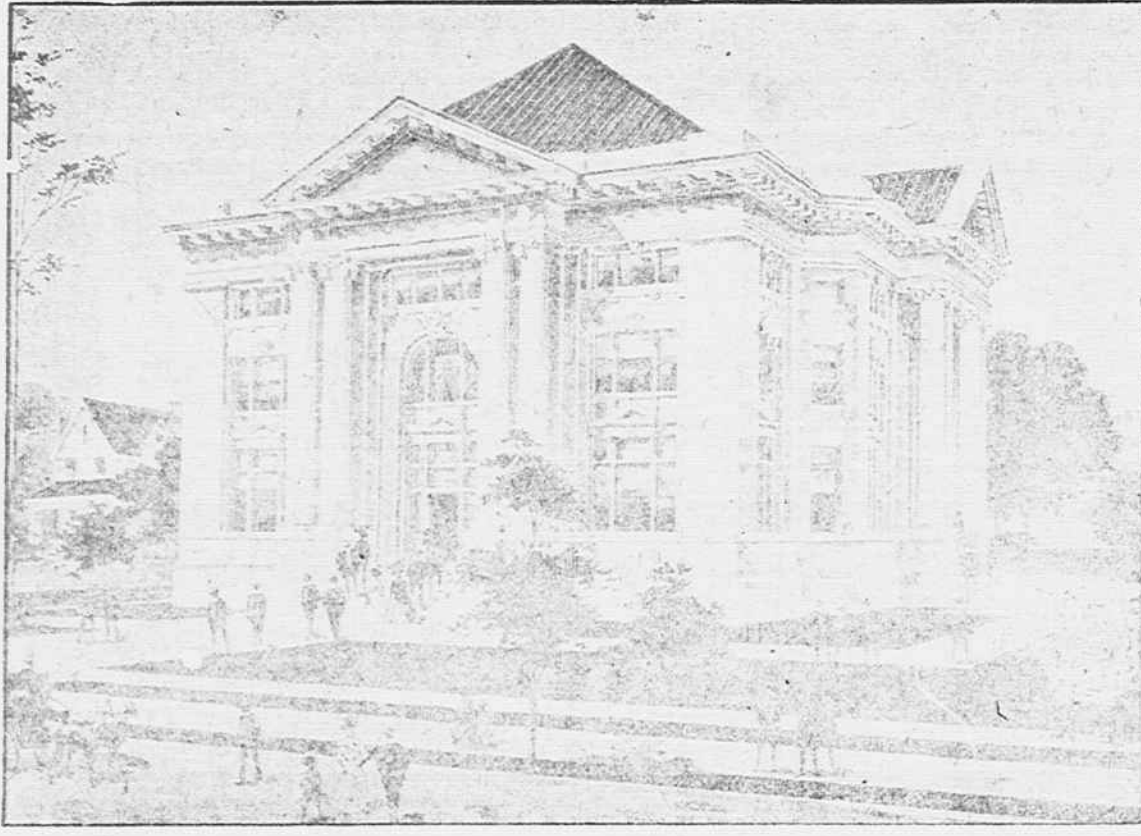

every direction, and seven rural free delivery routes go out from Newberry—supplying practically every family within a radius of eighteen miles with their mail and offering them the modern advantages of the parcel post for the transaction of their business.
