The information contained in this clipping may be of interest and possibly of value in the future. The boll weevils damaged the cotton crop of this county considerably last year but not quite so much this season. I know you are interested in the welfare of the farmers of Newberry county and if you so desire, I will send you any information I may get that would assist in destroying the boll weevil, or keeping them out of the county. Personally, I would be very glad to be of any assistance to them. The principal products of this part of the State are wheat and cotton. It is also an oil center and money is plentiful. WILL AID IN FIGHT ON BOLL WEEVIL

Many Agree to Plow Cotton Stalks Under As Soon as Crop is Gathered.

J. W. Campbell, government demonstration agent for this county is making an earnest effort to destroy the boll weevils that have infested this district during the past season, and to that end he announces that he will make a thorough canvass of the county in an effort to induce as many farmers as possible to turn their cotton stalks under as early as possible after the present crop has been gathered. It has been demonstrated by government tests that this is the best means of checking the ravages of the pest and he is anxious to obtain the best results possible before planting another crop. In a very short canvass one day last week he obtained a large number of signers at Burk Burnett, pledging themselves to this plan of the government for destroying the weevil and in a short time in this city Saturday he received a number of signatures of those interested in the production of cotton, promising to carry out the idea suggested in the government bulletin. Mr. Campbell expects to make an effort to see every man in Wichita county who is interested in the production of cotton, and will include not only those who are actually farming, but all who have land upon which the staple is raised. The petition that is being circulated and the names secured in the few hours work in this city, is as follows: "It having been demonstrated by the government experimental stations that the breaking of the cotton stalk land, and turning the stalks under in the early fall as soon as the crop is gathered, kills and destroys some 80 to 90 per cent of the boll weevils, we the undersigned agree to brake and cover up the cotton stalks, on all cotton lands on our farms or lands under our control, or lands to be cultivated by us, just as soon as the same can possibly be done after the cotton is gathered."

SCHOOL NOTES

The ordinance of the city of Newberry bearing on vaccination is as follows: "Sec. 111. No superintendent of any institution of learning, and no school board or principal of any school in this town, shall admit as a pupil any child or person who cannot produce satisfactory evidence of having been vaccinated as required in sections 108 and 109, and it is hereby made the duty of every parent, guardian, or other person charged with the care and responsibility of any child to see that such child is vaccinated as often as required by sections 108 and 109. "Sec. 112. That any officer or person who shall neglect or refuse to comply with the provisions of sections 108, 109 or 110 shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than \$100, or be imprisoned for not more than 30 days." The attention of parents and guardians is called to this ordinance of the city. In a game of football at the college on Thursday afternoon between the High school and the Freshmen, the score was 19 to 0 in favor of the High school. The Parent-Teachers association of the Boundary Street school held a good meeting Wednesday afternoon. On Saturday afternoon of last week a Parent-Teachers association was organized at the Oakland school. This school was recently added by the county board of education to the Newberry district. The first work of this association will be to raise money for a library for the school. The Thursday morning hour at the High school is proving to be very popular with pupils and teachers. Recently the Rev. E. W. Babb made a very entertaining talk on the "Humming Bird." On last Thursday morning Dr. George B. Cromer delighted the students with a talk on "First Things"—the importance of beginning right. All the patrons and friends of the school are invited to attend this exercise. 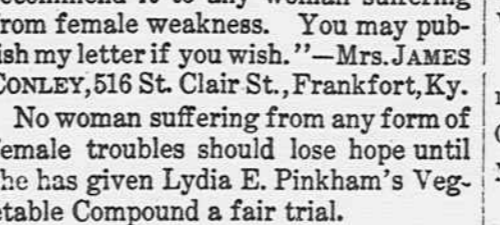
