### DR. S. T. HALLMAN WRITES ABOUT LUTHERAN CHURCH

Spartanburg Herald. Editor of The Herald:

One of the things which has often pained me is the fact that many people have entirely wrong impressions as to the relation between the Lutheran church and one of the warring nations.

The notion has really been circulated that we Lutheran Christians are naturally, and necessarily siding with German Autocracy when nothing can be further from the truth. The unreasoning mind says, "Lutheranism had its origin in Germany, and Lutherans are, therefore, Pro-German." They forget that Protestantism had its origin in Germany, and that there are many thousands of German Baptists, German Methodists, German Presbyterians, German Episcopalians and German religionists of other types.

Some have the notion that the Lutheran church in Germany is the State church and had much to do with the war, when nothing could be further from the facts. The German Empire has no state church, nor is the Kaiser a Lutheran at all. He belongs to a conglomerate mass called "The United Church of Prussia"—a reformed mixture. This mixture, together with the Roman Catholic church, holds the balance of power in that war-cursed land, and the faith of Luther is in no way responsible for this world conflict. The last public act of Luther's life was that of a mission to prevent war; and our ministry has always been taught, and ordained, to confine themselves to the Gospel, and not matters of state.

Three of the largest general Lutheran bodies in the United States by official act, have urged our people to loyalty and faithfully support the president, and congress, in the prosecution of this war against imperialism. One of the strongest Lutheran colleges in this country holds the record of having one hundred per cent. of her eligible students volunteer for service in the American army. Besides, the Lutheran church in the world is not a German church but the church of all lands; and it equals in numbers all the other Protestant churches combined. We have

over 80,000,000 members in the world.

How, then can any well informed and fair-minded person charge the Lutherans with being responsible for this war? This is a gross misrepresentation, not to say, "a vile slander."

The following from the Columbia State is worthy of note, and furnishes food for thought:

"The United Inner Mission of the Evangelical Lutheran church in the United States is distributing a pamphlet entitled 'Christian Service in War Times,' containing suggestions to pastors and congregations from which the State quotes this paragraph:

"In this national crisis let all willingly render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's. Let us not shirk our responsibilities nor guiltily seek personal advantage whereby the burdens of others are increased. In accordance with God's word, let us give loyal support to all measures adopted by our government to cope with the present situation. Let us meet promptly all lawful demands on our service, property and life. Our conduct as citizens must be above suspicion and reproach. We cannot be loyal to God and disloyal to our government, for 'the powers that be are ordained of God.'"

"Inasmuch as the position of the Lutheran church has been discussed in the press. The State finds pleasure in printing the foregoing clear and unequivocal expressions. As the State has already said, there could be no just criticism of the Lutheran church. It is not exclusively a German church and probably it has a larger membership in the countries hostile to Germany than in that empire and its allied countries. When the responsible boards of the various branches of the American Lutheran church call upon their people to 'meet promptly all lawful demands on their service, property and life' and say that 'their conduct as citizens must be above suspicion and reproach' they say as much as any other church is saying or could be expected to say."—S. T. Hallman.

### SHIPS SENT DOWN BY BIG SUBMARINE

Crews of Vessels Destroyed by German U-Boats Brought to Atlantic Port.

An Atlantic Port, Aug. 6.—The crews of seven vessels, six of which were sunk by German submarines off the Azores Islands, were brought here today by a French steamer which took them on board at a port of call on her voyage from Europe.

The vessels sunk by submarines were:

Italian bark Doris, 1,353 tons, last reported as leaving Buenos Ayres, May 8; Canadian schooner Wilhelmina Gertrude; American four masted schooner John Twohy, 1,019 tons, from Norfolk, Va., for Algiers, Capt. J. B. Moorehouse; Norwegian steamer Ellen, 3,877 tons, from Philadelphia for Marselles, Capt. John Lothe; Norwegian steamer Hanseat, 3,353 tons, from an Italian port for Hampton Roads, Capt. Evenser; Norwegian steamer Portland, 2,472 tons, Stockholm for France, Capt. Lyngholm.

The seventh vessel, the British schooner Conqueror, of 150 tons, was abandoned and went down June 11 off Flores, after she had sprung a leak in rough weather. She encountered no submarine, according to her crew.

The sinking of all these vessels except the Ellen, Doris and Wilhelmina Gertrude had been previously reported. Captain Lothe of the Ellen said his vessel carried 11 locomotives of large size intended for use on railroads which American engineers are constructing behind the battle lines in France.

The procedure of the Germans was the same in all cases, according to the crews. The vessels were stopped, boarded by the submarine commander, and the men ordered to the lifeboats, after which mines or bombs were placed in the ships and exploded. Then the submarine towed the lifeboats a few miles toward shore and gave them the right direction before submerging.

It required two days or more in the most instances for the crews to sail and row to St. Maria in the Azores.

Both Captain Lothe and Captain Evenser of the Hanseat said that the submarine which sank their vessels was commanded by Lieutenant Eyring. They were taken on board the submarine while their lifeboats were being towed. Captain Lothe said the submarine was the largest one he had ever seen, carrying a crew of 71 men and mounting two 6-inch guns.

### GREENWOOD MAN SLAYS HIS WIFE

Boyd Objected to His Wife Visiting Her Parents, at Whose Home Tragedy Occurred

Greenwood, Aug. 6.—Enraged because his wife had left him to visit her parents, after he had told her she should not do so, Frank Boyd, aged 23, shot and killed his wife yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and wounded his mother-in-law with four shots from his automatic pistol. The mother in law, Mrs. Crane, is now in the Greenwood Hospital and it is believed she will recover. She has two bullet wounds in the face and one in each arm. The dead wife, Mrs. Minnie Crane Boyd, was shot twice in the left breast and once in the head. The shooting occurred at the Crane home in Grendel mill village No. 2 in South Greenwood. Boyd and his wife lived in the Greenwood mill village.

Mrs. Boyd wanted to visit her parents and he told her not to go. She went anyway and Boyd followed later in the day and as soon as he walked up on the front piazza began shooting at his wife and when she fell, turned on his mother in law. After the shooting he submitted quietly to arrest at the hands of Deputy Sprouse of the village and made no resistance whatever when Sheriff McMillan and Mr. Chandler, chief of police, put him in an automobile and carried him to the county jail. He is still in jail and refuses to make any statement or even answer questions, maintaining a stolid silence. He is a native of Laurens County but has lived in Greenwood County almost all of his life.

United States Navy Recruiting Service

Main Station Arcade Building Columbia, S. C., August 5. To the Editor of The Herald and News.

Dear Sir: In view of the generous response of the young men of South Carolina to the call of our president for men to man the ships of our navy I take this opportunity to thank you, personally, for the valuable assistance you have generously given us in our work.

Without this patriotic and unselfish attitude on the part of the state press all our efforts would have been unavailing, as we could not have gotten the very necessary publicity.

At the present time we are allowed to enlist only 10 men per week from South Carolina. I am afraid that our weekly quota will be still further reduced. I would, therefore, recommend that any young men desiring to enter the navy apply as early as possible. Our navy is a great institution and offers a fine opportunity for the young men under 21 years of age to serve his country, broaden his views of life, see the world and assure his future.

A simple reading of Admiral Gleave's report of the conveying of our first troops to France by the navy should be inspiring to every young man, and if inclined that way, should influence him to join the navy now, or for country boys after crops are gathered. We only have vacancies as apprentice seamen and firemen third class.

### HOUSTON APPEALS FOR FOOD SAVING

Washington, Aug. 7.—President Wilson's patriotic appeal to the country's farmers and gardeners having been answered with bumper crops it is now up to the consumers to do their share by conserving perishable foods, according to a statement issued by Secretary Houston today in which he suggests particular ways in which housewives can render definite national service.

"I urge not only that every home assist in the conservation of the surplus perishable fruits and vegetables by canning, preserving, pickling, drying and storing, but also that every experienced woman place her knowledge at the disposal of her neighbors.

"To that end it is specially recommended that women call their organizations together for discussion of conservation work, that demonstrations in canning and preserving be given, and that they cooperate with local food officials."

The secretary points out that the time for conserving foods is short and says that it is of prime importance that they shall not be wasted.
